#### Summary of Q & A for Community College Counselors and Advisers

##### 1. What information can you share about Fall 2018 transfer admission?

**NOTES:** For all campuses, final admit numbers will not be available until the summer months. Waitlist information is available on a separate document on the UC Admissions website on the ETS Event page.

<b>Berkeley</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Received more than 19,000 applications for transfer admissions.</li> <li>Expect to enroll more than 2,500 new transfer students. Use of waitlist possible to meet our transfer enrollment goals.</li> </ul>
<b>Davis</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Commitment to transfer students and continue to surpass the UC enrollment goal ratio of 2:1.</li> <li>Received close to 18,000 fall 2018 applications; transfer enrollment goal is 3,200.</li> <li>Selection/Admissions was similar to past years, except this year Social Sciences was more selective.</li> </ul>
<b>Irvine</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Received over 21,000 applications. A very strong pool of transfer applicants.</li> <li>Focused on reaching enrollment goal of 2:1, and number of admits reflect dedicated effort towards that objective.</li> </ul>
<b>UCLA</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Received just over 23,000 transfer applications and expects to enroll just over 3,200 students, a slightly larger number than for fall 2017.</li> <li>Transfer applicants are only considered for admission to the fall term.</li> </ul>
<b>Merced</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Received 3,448 transfer applications for fall 2018.</li> <li>Offered an alternative enrollment term for applicants with a strong academic history only lacking 1-2 required courses.</li> <li>Some applicants were admitted to an alternate major if they: did not meet selection for their primary major, selected an alternate major and met selection criteria for it.</li> <li>No changes in selection for fall 2018 from fall 2017.</li> </ul>
<b>Riverside</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Received over 12,500 transfer applications, an 18% increase over the 2017 admissions cycle.</li> <li>Expects to enroll 1,815 new California resident transfer students for 2018/19, almost 400 additional students compared to 2017/18--approximately 1,550 students for fall 2018 and 265 students for winter 2019.</li> <li>Considers transfer students for their selected alternate major with the exception of cases in which the preferred major is a science or engineering discipline and the listed alternate major is within the College of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences.</li> </ul>
<b>San Diego</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Received close to 19,000 transfer applications for fall 2018.</li> <li>Applicants to capped and highly selective majors were screened for major preparation during the review.</li> <li>A number of applicants were invited to join the waitlist which has a May 15, 2018 opt-in deadline.</li> </ul>
<b>Santa Barbara</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Made approximately 9,800 admit offers for fall 2018, up slightly from 2017.</li> <li>More than 94% of these are students from CCCs.</li> <li>Expect to enroll 2,275 new students for fall.</li> </ul>
<b>Santa Cruz</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Expect to enroll 1,350 new transfers.</li> <li>Some students were offered a winter 2019 admission if they complete specific courses in summer/fall 2018.</li> <li>Some students who meet general selection but not major prep were offered an alternate major.</li> </ul>

## 2. What are some of the most competitive majors at your campus?

<b>Berkeley</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Psychology, Business, Economics, Electrical Engineering, and Computer Science</li> <li>• Students applying to selective majors must complete all college and major prerequisites as listed on ASSIST.</li> <li>• Applicants should demonstrate interest in the major (e.g. examples of academic and non-academic involvement).</li> <li>• If no opportunity for involvement in the academic area of study– applicants should address this on the application. In general, the campus seeks involvement both in and outside the classroom – leadership, employment, family responsibilities... all of this information is taken into consideration.</li> </ul>
<b>Davis</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Computer Science, Psychology, all majors in the Colleges of Biological Sciences &amp; Engineering</li> <li>• <b>Fall 2020 new Selective majors:</b> Applied Physics, Physics, Mathematics, Pharmaceutical Chemistry (all require a 3.0 GPA in major prep courses)</li> <li>• <b>Fall 2021 new Selective majors:</b> Economics (CLS) (3.0 GPA in major prep courses) &amp; Managerial Economics (CAES) (2.5 GPA in major prep courses)</li> </ul>
<b>Irvine</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Business Administration- strength of grades in major prep as well as cumulative.</li> <li>• Nursing- details provided in supplemental app; experience related to nursing field, clarity that they want to be a nurse, not just using as a springboard for medical school.</li> <li>• Computer Science-academic strength in major prep</li> <li>• Engineering-completion of major prep and academic strength</li> </ul>
<b>UCLA</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The most selective and most applied to majors are Business Economics, Economics, and Psychology. Specialty schools: Engineering, Nursing, Architecture and Film are also selective.</li> <li>• For the selective majors in the College of Letters and Science, to be more competitive, students should complete major prep by end of the Fall term in which they are applying.</li> <li>• If available to the student, try to participate in the Transfer Alliance Program (TAP), for priority consideration in the admissions process for College of Letters and Science majors.</li> </ul>
<b>Merced</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• All programs at UC Merced have required major preparation course work.</li> <li>• Any applicant who meets admission requirements and complete required major preparation course work with the required GPA is admissible to the major.</li> </ul>
<b>Riverside</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Psychology and Business Administration are the two most competitive majors. 25% of transfer applicants to apply to these two majors.</li> <li>• For students who meet all major preparation requirements for these majors, selection is based on GPA.</li> </ul>
<b>San Diego</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Bioengineering, Computer Science and Mechanical &amp; Aerospace Engineering.</li> <li>• Students interested in these majors, and all of our capped and selective majors, must complete major preparation.</li> </ul>
<b>Santa Barbara</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• All Engineering, Economics and Biological Science Majors.</li> <li>• Successful completion of major preparation courses and a strong GPA are the largest factors in the review process.</li> </ul>
<b>Santa Cruz</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students are held to meeting selection criteria which includes major prep courses and specified GPA.</li> </ul>

### 3. What are some key admission events your campus wants to share with our students?

<b>Berkeley</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Fall transfer fairs:</b> admissions representatives attend fairs at most California Community College.</li> <li>• <b>On-campus presentations</b> hosted for visiting CCC programs.</li> <li>• August – November – <b>One-on-one advising</b> offered on a drop-in basis at the Transfer Student Center in the Cesar E. Chavez Student Center, Monday - Friday from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM.</li> <li>• <b>Webinars</b> offered to assist students and counselors with applying to UC Berkeley.</li> <li>• <b>Be.Berkeley.edu</b> - Highly encourage prospective applicants to connect with the campus by registering at <a href="http://Be.Berkeley.edu">Be.Berkeley.edu</a>.</li> <li>• Registered students and counselors will receive information on upcoming events, application information, and introduce university resources.</li> <li>• Encourage students to take advantage of the resource provided for prospective students not only because they would be better informed but they will also get a sense as to whether UC Berkeley is good fit.</li> </ul>
<b>Davis</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• May 11: <b>Decision UC Davis</b> - Bringing students to the campus is the best way to help them determine whether UC Davis is the right fit.</li> <li>• August: <b>Transfer Orientation</b> –All students are expected to attend orientation.</li> <li>• <b>Tours, presentations and advising</b> - Students are encouraged to visit the <b>Welcome Center</b> anytime during the week. Tours are also available on weekends (Sundays only April). <b>UCLA</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Pre-advising appointments</b> - Students can check with their transfer center within LA County, Northern CA, Central CA, San Diego and Inland Empire about scheduling an appointment.</li> <li>• <b>Meet Your Counselor</b> - A transfer representative is assigned to every CCC so even if UCLA does not physically visit a college, students can connect with UCLA via email; a list of reps can be found via the Meet Your Counselor link on the admissions site <a href="http://www.admission.ucla.edu/meet-your-counselor.htm">www.admission.ucla.edu/meet-your-counselor.htm</a>.</li> <li>• <b>Events page</b> - Students can visit the events page (<a href="http://www.admission.ucla.edu/events/">http://www.admission.ucla.edu/events/</a>) for happenings both on and off campus throughout the year. Students may register for orientation as soon as they SIR.</li> <li>• July 20-22, 2018: <b>Transfer Academy</b> is a residential program.
