Defining a transfer student

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Who is a transfer applicant?

A transfer applicant is any applicant who has:

- 1) Graduated from, left high school, or equivalent (*such as a GED or HiSET*)
- 2) Enrolled in a regular term at a college or university after high school



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Enrolled in a regular term and completed the term. Graduated/completed high school or equivalent such as GED, California Proficiency HiSET, etc.

- Your students must apply as a transfer applicant if they're enrolled in a regular session (fall, winter or spring) at a college or university after high school graduation/completion.
 - Exception: student that takes classes during the summer after high school graduation/completion is still a first-year applicant.

Which of these students would be considered a transfer applicant?



Isabella is a junior in high school and is currently taking courses at a California Community College. She will have completed over 60 semester/90 quarter UC transferable units by the time she graduates high school.



Josh received his high school diploma but decided to take some time after graduation. He is now enrolled in a winter/spring term at his local community college.



Sofia graduated from her high school in December and is now enrolled in her local community college for the spring semester.

- Considerations: Dual-enrollment and mid-year students; encourage these students to apply as FR for campus services
 - **IF** they apply as a TR and meet requirements – we will evaluate them as such

Definition of a California Community College transfer student

Student has completed at **least 30 semester (45 quarter) UC-transferable units** at one or more California Community Colleges



A California Community College is the student's **last college attended** in a regular session before enrolling at a UC campus

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If the student went to a CCC and then transferred to a CSU and then changed their mind and wanted to transfer to a UC, they are no longer defined as a CCC student. This is important because UCs give preference to CCC transfer students.

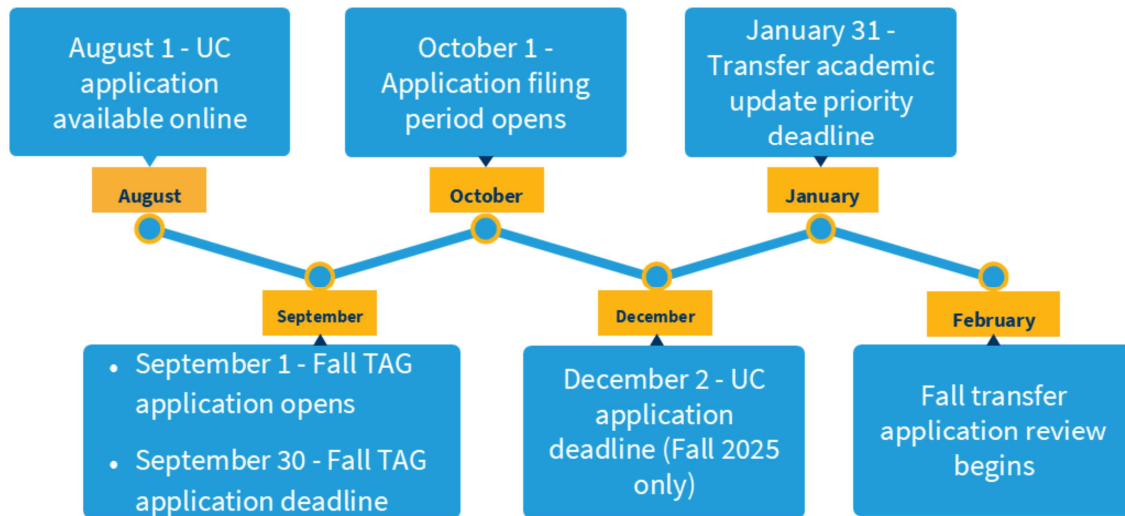
Transfer timeline

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Transfer timeline



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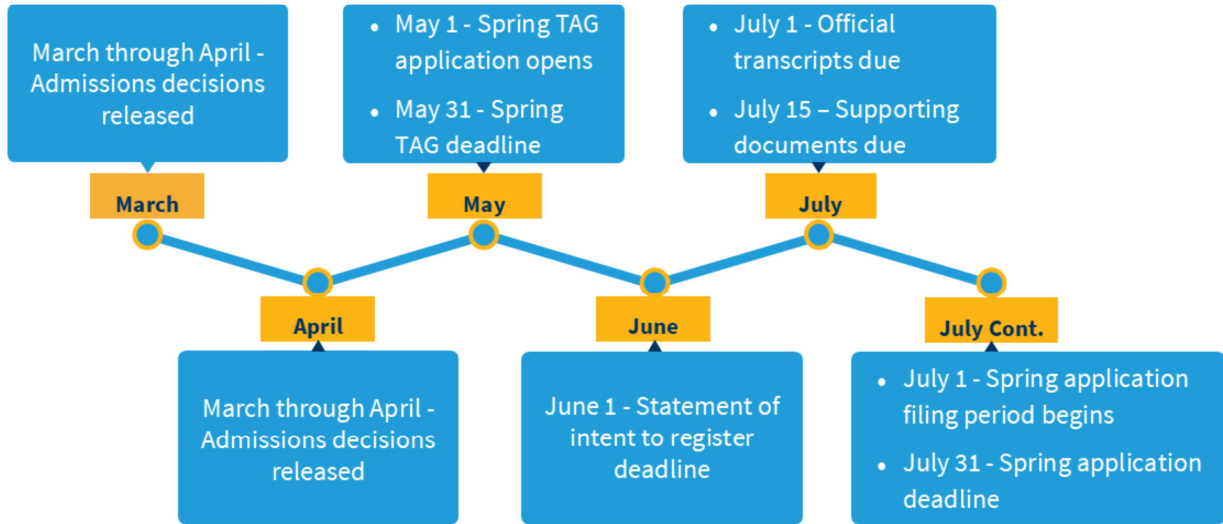
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TAG (Transfer Admissions Guarantee) – TAP-TAG session will go further in-depth regarding TAG. Please read TAG definition: Six UC campuses offer guaranteed admission to students from all CA community colleges. Interested students must meet campus-specific requirements to qualify for a TAG. By participating in a TAG program, students can ensure their admission to a specific UC campus.

Please remember to remind students to submit applications between October 1 - December 2 for the fall term and between July 1-31 for the winter/spring term.

- December 2 – deadline relevant for Fall 2025 applicants only

Transfer timeline



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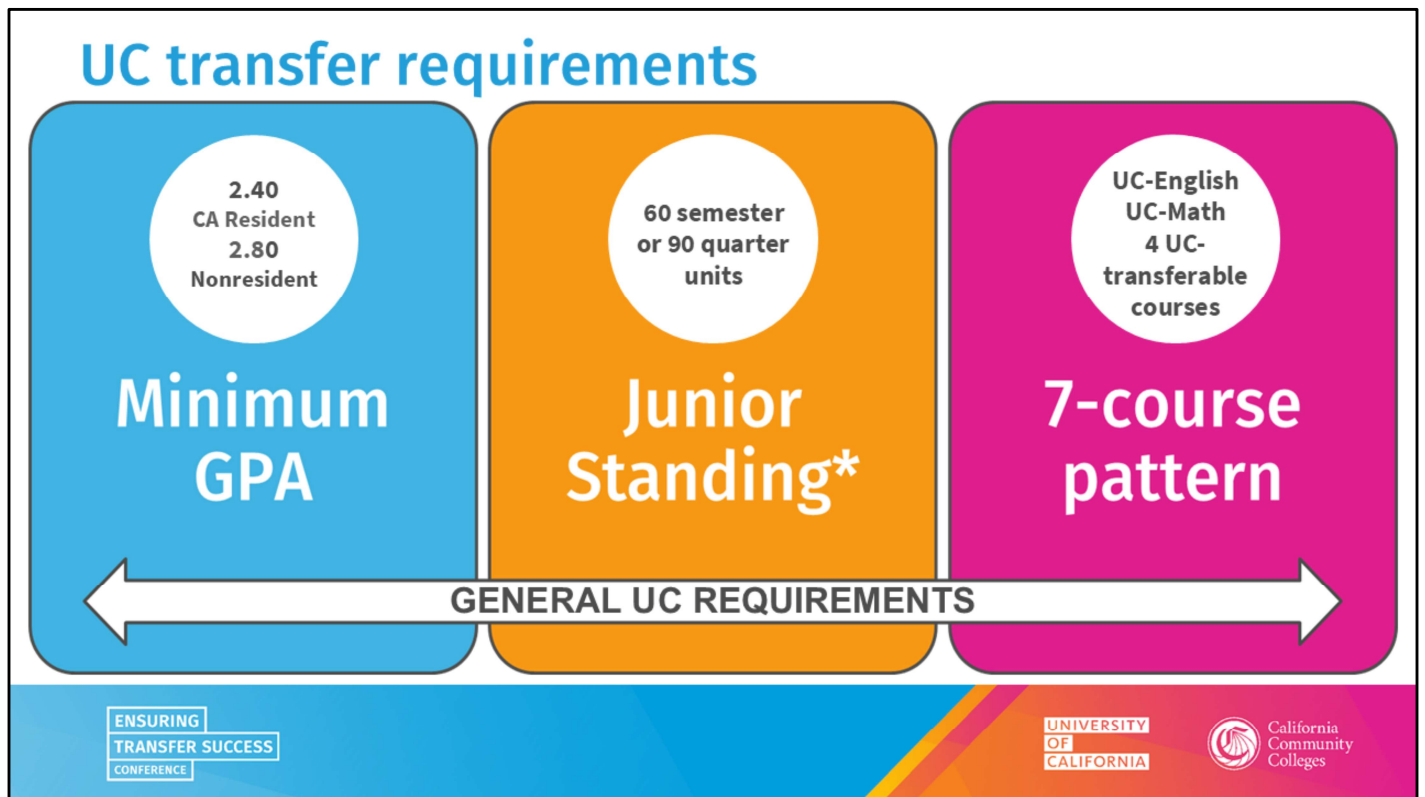
July 15 – supporting documents such as IGETC, AP/IB scores, etc.

Eligibility vs. selection

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Basic eligibility requirements – GPA, units, 7-course pattern. Reminder that eligibility does not mean admission!

60 sem/90 qtr in UC-transferable units

7-course pattern:

Two transferable **English** composition courses

One transferable course in **mathematical** concepts & quantitative reasoning

Four transferable college courses chosen from at least two of the following subject areas:

- **Arts & Humanities**
- **Social & Behavioral Sciences**
- **Physical and Biological Sciences**

UC-transferable GPA



- **GPA vs. UC-transferable GPA**
 - The overall GPA listed on the CCC transcript is *different* than an applicant's UC-transferable GPA
- **UC-transferable GPA**
 - Only takes into account grades from transferable courses
 - Non-transferable courses are *not* calculated into UC transferable GPA

7-Course pattern

Must be completed by the end of the spring term prior to transferring in the fall

- **2** transferable courses in English composition
- **1** transferable course in mathematical concepts and quantitative reasoning
- **4** transferable college courses chosen from at least two of the following subject areas:
 - arts and humanities
 - social and behavioral sciences
 - physical and biological sciences

For example, if the student is entering their first term at the UC in fall 2025, 7-course pattern must be completed spring 2025.

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On **ASSIST**, courses marked with "**UC-**" will satisfy the five areas of the seven-course requirements:

E = English, M = Math, H = Humanities, B = Behavioral and Social Sciences, S = Biological and Physical Sciences.

- Some majors are more selective than others, meaning it will be more competitive
- Not all CCCs offer MP for certain majors, so we will have to utilize other selection criteria to make our decisions

Evaluation topics

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Common course limitations

PE activity courses are limited to 4 semester/6 quarter units

PE theory courses are limited to 8 semester/12 quarter units

College algebra and pre-calculus combined are limited to one course or the other

Statistics is limited to one course

ESL is limited to 8 semester/12 quarter units

College counseling is limited to 3 semester/4.5 quarter units

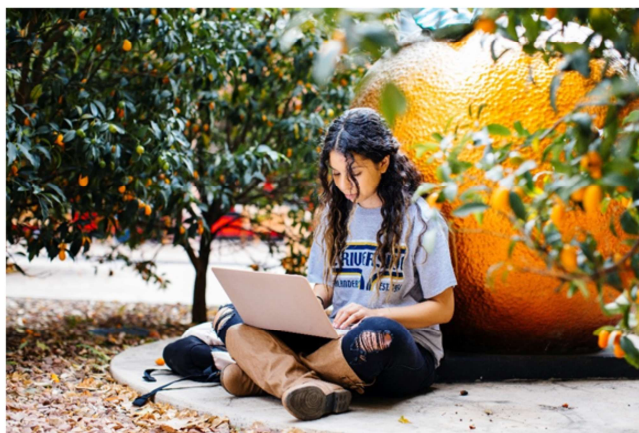
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Sequential subjects

- Math, language other than English, ESL and chemistry are sequential subjects
- No credit for lower-level course after a more advanced level has already been completed with a C or higher grade*
- Check prerequisites in course catalog to determine the sequential order of courses



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Sequential subjects for UC are chemistry, English as a second language (ESL), languages other than English (LOTE), and mathematics. Repeat of courses out of sequence is not allowed.

*If a student earned a 'C' or better in a sequential course, they can't go back to a lower level (LL) and receive credit.

NEW POLICY: If 'C-' (below 2.0) or lower, can go back to a LL course and receive credit for LL course.***Applicable to all sequential subjects (Math, chem, LOTE, ESL)

- *For TR students only*
- Student is still receiving credit for D grade in Upper Level (UL) course unless repeated

Note: Although not common, in some cases Organic CHEM 1 can be taken before CHEM 1B if the college's catalog states the prerequisite for Organic CHEM 1 is CHEM 1A only. Check course catalog for prerequisites.

Always check the left column for notations concerning limitations

Notice the limits on Chemistry courses at Saddleback College



- * No credit for CHEM 2 if taken after CHEM 1A, CHEM 1B
- + No credit for CHEM 3 if taken after CHEM 1A
- o No credit for CHEM 13 if taken after CHEM 12A, CHEM 12B

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Common sequence limits tend to show up in math, chemistry, and languages. Remember, all these limits will be notes in footnotes, which is why it is so critical to train yourself and to remind students to look for them.

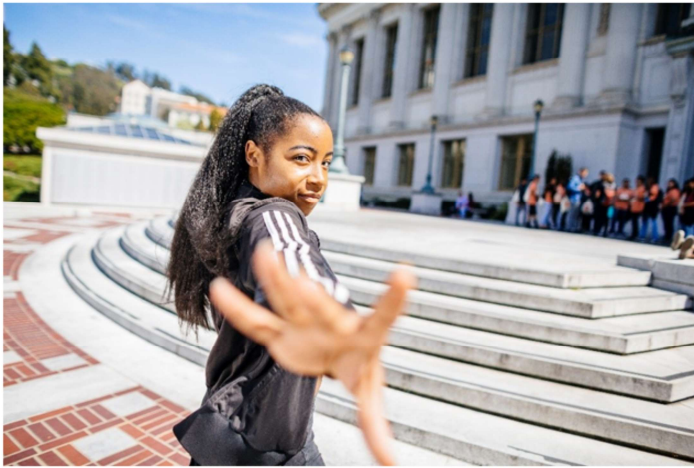

Always be mindful of the footnotes!

Duplicate limits also show up for honors courses. We give credit to the course that benefits the student, while keeping in mind units, MP, grade earned

Academic renewal



- Students may elect to have previously completed courses disregarded in the computation of their cumulative grade point average (GPA)
- Academic renewal is **not the same** as repeating courses
- Approved academic renewal courses will have a special notation on students' CCC transcripts
- Courses should be marked as 'AR' on UC Application

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What is Academic Renewal? Removal of deficient grade from a student's record
Petitions for academic renewal must be done at the institution where the course was taken
The Transfer Admission 201 will go over AR extensively

Withdrawals

- Coursework marked as 'Withdrawal' or 'Excused Withdrawal' has no grade point value

However...

- Failure to withdraw and unauthorized withdrawals are considered 'F' grades



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Withdrawals

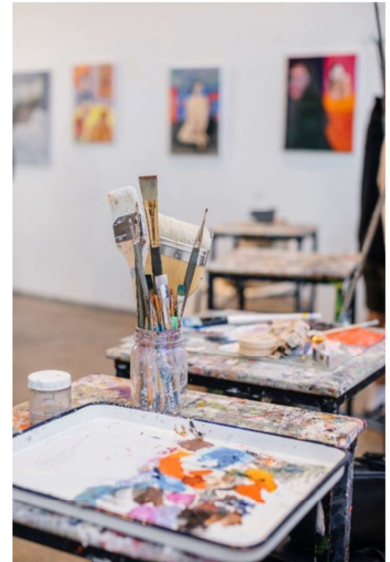
- It's important for a student to report withdrawals accurately
- Mention not included/included in GPA calculations
- **Student should not omit any withdrawals.**
 - While "W" and "EW" have no grade point value, it can trigger a gap in education if a student omits.
 - For example, student enrolled at the community college for fall 2020 and received "W" marks for every course. The student omits fall 2020. The student reports courses starting in spring 2021. It's likely the student may be contacted to explain their gap in education. The student may not respond and this can impact the application review.
 - Another possibility is that the student may respond and state they enrolled in courses but ended up withdrawing from all their courses. The evaluator may request more details and/or an unofficial transcript to verify withdrawals. **This delays the review.** It's best for students to **report all courses and marks at the time of application.**
- **Always important to check the transcript keying form!**

Language of instruction (LOI)

- No lower-division credit for language acquisition courses or AP language exams if that language was the LOI in all of 9th grade or beyond
- OK to allow credit for lower-division literature courses

Example:

- LOI in 9th & 10th was Spanish, no credit for any CCC Spanish language courses/or AP Spanish Language. AP Spanish Literature ok for credit



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A student who has completed at least nine years of education (or through the ninth grade) conducted in a language of instruction that was not English, including a full year of coursework equivalent to a year within grades 9–12 of the U.S. curriculum, may receive credit for language courses in the language of instruction only for courses taken at international collegiate institutions (where the language of instruction is not English) or for upper-division courses taken at UC or at another English-speaking institution of approved standing.

College credit for literature in the language of instruction is allowed.

The ASSIST public website (assist.org) includes the 2023-2024 academic year as an available selection for transferability lists.

Thanks to the improved technology supporting the assist.org website, we can release the new academic year in phases. The first release phase for the 2024-2025 academic year is for the transferability list search box.

The Modernized Articulation application has not yet been released to CSU and UC AOs in a live environment, which means that articulation agreements for 2024-2025 have not yet been published. As such, the new academic year for articulation agreement searching will be added in a second release phase.

A “Coming Soon” banner is now available on assist.org to communicate that the availability of 2024-2025 modernized articulation agreements is forthcoming.

Articulation is campus-specific, so to view articulated courses, you must indicate a specific institution in the “**Agreement with other Institutions**” box. If a student is trying to meet major requirements for multiple UC campuses, they will need to check articulation agreements separately on ASSIST for each campus and they may have different courses for that same or a similar major.

Campus-specific articulation determines whether CCC coursework will satisfy major, breadth or other requirements at each UC campus. Each respective UC campus manages the following:

- Campus-specific general education/breadth agreements
- Course-to-course agreements (by department)
- Lower division major preparation agreements

GENERAL INFORMATION FOR ALL MAJORS

All transfer applicants must satisfy University of California admissions eligibility requirements as well as meet campus selection criteria. All admission requirements must be completed by the end of spring prior to transfer. For more information on UC admissions eligibility requirements and admission to UC Santa Cruz, please visit the Admissions website: <https://admission.ucsf.edu/transfer-students>

This articulation agreement lists course-to-course, sequence-to-sequence or requirement substitutions for preparation in the major. Transfer students are strongly encouraged to complete as many major preparatory courses as possible prior to enrolling at UCSJ. Completion of all major preparatory courses to meet an admission requirement does not ensure admission to the articulated major as transferable units are competitive and meet completion of major preparatory courses will help students move more efficiently toward graduation after transfer.

ADMISSION SELECTION CRITERIA

To be considered for admission to the Business Management Economics B.A. major, transfer students must complete equivalents of the following courses with a grade of C- (2.0) or better in each course, and with a combined overall GPA of 2.00 in the three required courses, by the end of spring term for students planning to enter in the fall.

ECON 1: Introductory Macroeconomics: Resource Allocation and Market Structure

ECON 2: Introductory Macroeconomics: Aggregate Economic Activity

One of the following courses:

AM 11A/ECON 11A: Mathematical Methods for Economics I OR MATH 11A: Calculus with Applications OR MATH 11B: Calculus for Science, Engineering, and Mathematics

In addition, the following courses or their equivalents are strongly recommended prior to transfer to ensure timely graduation:

AM 11B/ECON 11B: Mathematical Methods for Economics II OR MATH 22: Introduction to Calculus of Several Variables OR MATH 23A: Vector Calculus

ECON 10A: Economics of Accounting

ECON 10B: Economics of Accounting

Prospective students are encouraged to prioritize required and recommended major preparation, and may additionally complete courses that articulate to UC Santa Cruz general education requirements as time allows.

COMPUTER LITERACY REQUIREMENT

Although not a requirement for transfer, students may complete the major's computer literacy requirement prior to transfer by completing equivalents of two of the Computer Science and Engineering (ESE) courses from the list below.

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You can see the actual articulation here. In the previous slide, we saw the top of the agreement list that UC Santa Cruz courses were on the left and Grossmont College were on the right. The first thing to note here is the indication of **required** courses, **these are required for admission**.

Without these, a **student will not meet minimum eligibility for the major**.

The screenshot on the right indicates additional major prep. These courses are **recommended**, as they may help a student be more competitive for a selective campus or major but ultimately they do not have to have all the recommended courses completed for admissions purposes.

They will, however, need these courses eventually as part of their **graduation requirements** for the major, which is why they are called additional major. We always encourage students to complete as much of their major coursework at the CCC level as possible to help them keep their timeline to graduation shorter.

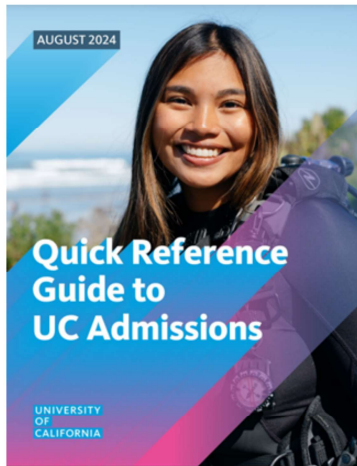

- Many of these programs partner with local CCC's from the area
- Other benefits include: campus life immersion events, peer mentoring, campus scholarship opportunities
