

The foundation: Junior transfer admission requirements










A CCC course and its multiple paths



The transferability of courses is essential to the transfer process. A single course can be reviewed for a variety of considerations.







Courses can be...

Transferable

- Count towards meeting admission requirements
- Apply towards graduation requirements

Articulated

- Count towards meeting admission requirements and equivalent to major courses at UCs
- Apply towards major degree requirements





Background: Transfer articulation review cycles

JUNE - SEPTEMBER

- UC Transfer Course Agreement (TCA) submission and review
- UC transferability
- UC eligibility area approval (7-course pattern)
- Appeals: October 1 10

DECEMBER - APRIL/MAY

- Cal-GETC submission and review
- Fulfillment of Cal-GETC general education area (Cal-GETC Standards)
- Areas 1 6
- Appeals: June 1 10







The starting point: Course outline of record

The CCC articulation officer submits a course outline of record (COR) which includes:

- a) Course identifiers
- b) Dates or approval and effective term
- c) Course description including lecture and/or lab hours, and prerequisites
- d) Course objectives and course content
- e) Methods of instruction and evaluation
- f) Texts and readings
- g) Assignments











The review: UC transferability



The Transfer Articulation team at UCOP reviews the COR for **Transfer Course Agreements** (TCAs):

- UC transferability
- UC area designation (7-course pattern)

Resources used: Regulations by subject area established by BOARS, course catalogs and course outlines











Transfer Course Agreement (TCA) policy

A course may be **transferable** if it is appropriate for a university degree in terms of depth, scope, and rigor. A course that is comparable to a lower-division course offered at one or more UC campuses is transferable.

These guidelines should be used in conjunction with the general criteria contained within UC's Transfer Credit Practices













UC's Transfer Credit Practices

Courses determined to be essentially the same as courses offered for an undergraduate degree at any UC campus will be awarded credit if the course:



Is listed in the institution's catalog during the correct academic year



Includes the same or similar content



Requires the same or similar prerequisite coursework



Is offered at the same level of instruction







Regulations by subject area

- Subject areas are listed alphabetically
- Guidelines pertain to lower division courses and contain detailed information on what makes a course transferable or nontransferable
 - Can include details on pre-requisites and/or laboratory or field component



Articulation is an art, not a science. The regulations are used in conjunction with several resources to make transferability determinations.











Regulation by subject area example: Social sciences

Transferable courses:

- Academic in content, focusing on research, theory, and analysis.
- Topics covered are integrated into the larger academic context of the course and do not simply consist of a list of isolated topics.
- Methods of assessment include a final exam or paper counting for a substantial part of the student's grade.











Common UC limitations

PE activity courses are limited to 4 semester/6 quarter units

PE theory courses are limited to 8 semester/ 12 quarter units

College algebra and pre-calculus combined are limited to one course or the other

Statistics is limited to one course

ESL is limited to 8 semester/12 quarter units


College counseling is limited to 3 semester/ 4.5 quarter units







UC transferability review









The review: Cal-GETC

- Standards include details on courses that can be used for Cal-GETC
- Courses must be both CSU and UC transferable
- Section 9 provides details on subject areas and course guidelines














Background: Bachelor's degrees at UC

Upper-division courses

Major articulation!







The review: Campus articulation



The articulation officer at a UC campus facilitates the course review process for **articulation agreements**:

- Department agreements
 - Course-to-course articulation
- General education

Resources used:

- Campus-specific criteria
- Faculty guidance











Major articulation baseline

Articulation officers utilize the lower-division major courses to establish articulation agreements.

- Required or recommended for admission
- Degree requirements to graduate















UC-transferable but not articulated

Simply put, faculty have reviewed the course and do not see it comparable to the courses they are teaching at their campus.

It's possible you'd see courses that seem like they would be sufficient, but the authority rests with faculty.













The end point: ASSIST

Transfer Course Agreements and **articulation agreements** provide students and counselors essential information for UC admission.








ASSIST as a resource

- Imports transferability information into the UC Transfer Admission Planner (UC TAP) and the UC application










UC-transferable course details on ASSIST



- Courses and intersegmental GE patterns at each community college that are UC-transferable
- Important for meeting systemwide requirements
 - 7-course pattern
 - UC-transferable units
- Lists managed by Transfer Articulation at UCOP

IMPORTANT

This agreement lists courses transferable for unit credit at all UC campuses.

It is based on information from the current California community college catalog and is valid for the academic year indicated at the top of this agreement.

Courses marked with "UC-" will satisfy the five areas of the seven-course requirements:

E = English, M = Math, H = Humanities, B = Behavioral and Social Sciences, S = Biological and Physical Sciences.

NEURMATION ABOUT UC'S TRANSFERABLE COURSE AGREEMENTS

Honors Course Credit Limitation

- Duplicate credit will not be awarded for both the honors and the regular versions of a course.
- Credit will be awarded only to the first course completed with a grade of C or better.

Course Repeatability

- · An "ea" after the unit value of a course on this agreement is meant to indicate that the course may be repeated for credit under CCC campus policies.
- Since campus policies on repeatability vary, the "ea" indicator does not guarantee that UC will grant credit for every course that appears multiple times on a student's transcript. See the UC TCA for possible credit limitations.



Articulation agreements on ASSIST



- Specific to the CCC and a UC
- Important for reviewing campusspecific articulation
 - Major
 - Department
 - General education
- Lists managed by each campus through their articulation officer








Many choices, which to choose?

- Major: Major preparation, or CCC courses that will satisfy major requirements
- Department: Course-to-course articulations or series articulations
- **Prefix:** A preference! Will also display course-to-course articulations or series articulations
- **General education**: Not all campuses have GE information, but can be helpful for students looking to meet campus-specific GE

IMPORTANT MAJOR INFORMATION

There is no prerequisite course work required for admission to the Sociology major. The School of Social Sciences recommends that students complete IGETC prior to transfer and refer to the list of courses below that will fulfill UCI lower-division major requirements.

While not a requirement for admission purposes, all School of Social Sciences majors must satisfy a Mathematics Requirement and a computer education course. For full details, students should refer to the UCI General Catalogue.

Students have three options for completing the Mathematics Requirement before enrolling at UCI:

- 1) One semester of calculus (equivalent to UCI's MATH 2A) and one semester of statistics (equivalent to UCI's STATS 7 or MGMT 7) or
- 2) Two quarters of calculus (equivalent to UCI's MATH 2A and MATH 2B) and one quarter of statistics (equivalent to UCI's STATS 7 or MGMT 7) or
- 3) One year of statistics (equivalent to UCI's SOC SCI 10A, 10B and 10C)

In addition to the School of Social Sciences Math Requirement, all students are required to take course work equivalent to I&C SCI 31 or SOC SCI 3A.

NOTE: In fulfillment of the requirements below, a single course may be used only once.

ECONOMICS, B.A.

ADMISSION SELECTION CRITERIA - To be admitted to the Pre-Economics major, transfer applicants must complete the following courses with a 2.75 or better grade point average, with no individual grade lower than C (in addition to general admission requirements):

- 1. Microeconomics (the Advanced Placement Microeconomics exam will not satisfy this requirement)
- 2. Macroeconomics (the Advanced Placement Macroeconomics exam will not satisfy this requirement)
- 3. Calculus courses articulating with UCSB's MATH 3A-3B or MATH 34A-34B (a single course articulating with both MATH 34A and 34B is acceptable) MATH 3A-3B is highly recommended over MATH 34A-34B

A CCC student wants to compare the same major agreement at two different 4-year institutions.








UC Transfer Admission Planner (UC TAP)

- Academic history:
 - Schools attended
 - Coursework
- UC TAP uses ASSIST verified information to calculate:
 - UC-transferable units
 - UC GPA
 - Completion of the 7-course pattern









UC application

- The UC application uses
 ASSIST verified information
 which helps students enter
 academic information with
 ease.
- UC TAP import allows students to import UC TAP academic history into the UC application.










How TCAs support UC transfer

- CCCs offer a large variety of courses, but not all courses are UC-transferable
- Of those UC-transferable courses, not all will meet the 7-course pattern
 - Beyond the 7-course pattern, units can come from major prep, GE or both!
- Footnotes remind us if there are limits on credits
- Taking the correct courses help students meet
 UC junior transfer admission requirements







How articulation agreements support UC transfer

- Comprehensive review for transfer students draws heavily from academic factors
- Major preparation is one of the most important academic factors
- UC campuses determine their own articulation agreements
- UC campuses have admission representatives that can answer specific questions about articulation agreements


