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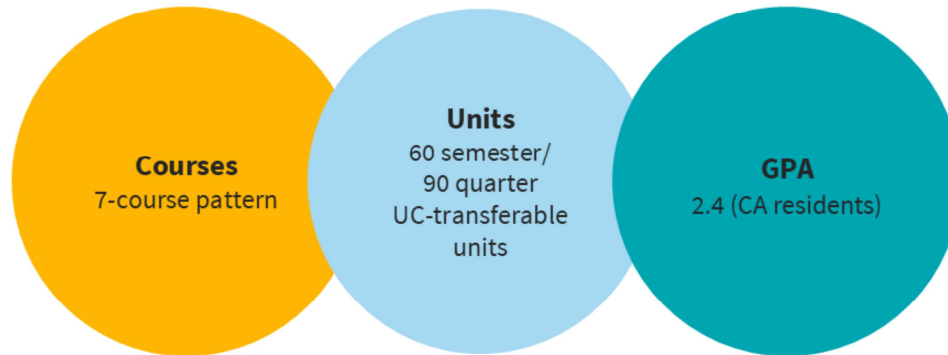

The foundation: Junior transfer admission requirements



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Transfer students must meet requirements in 3 areas to meet minimum UC transfer eligibility:

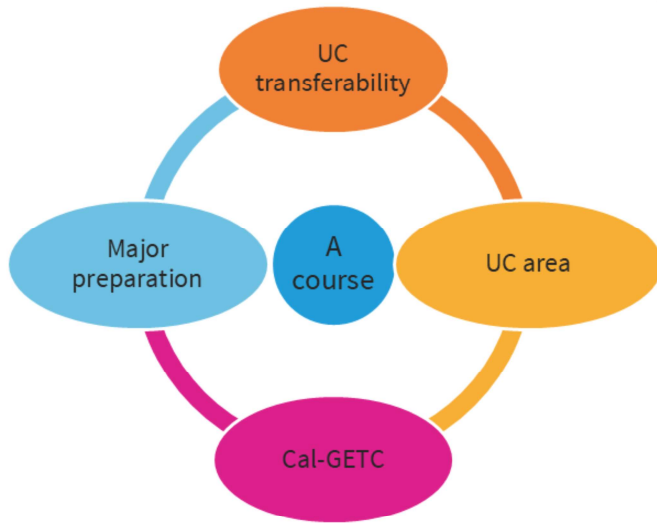
- Complete the **7-course pattern**.
- Complete at least **60 semester (90 quarter) units of UC-transferable credit**
- Earn at least a 2.4 GPA in UC-transferable courses (2.8 if they're a nonresident) but it is essential to note that some campuses and majors require a higher GPA for admission selection.

All requirements must be met by the end of the spring term prior to fall enrollment at UC.

It is important to note these requirements because these details are relevant and I will tie them back to the topics of course transferability and articulation.

We highlight these requirements because later in our slides we will highlight how to find these details on ASSIST.

A CCC course and its multiple paths



The transferability of courses is essential to the transfer process. A single course can be reviewed for a variety of considerations.

Our session today will focus on a CCC and its multiple parts. The transferability of courses is essential to the transfer process and a course may be reviewed for a variety of considerations.

Courses can be...

Transferable

- Count towards meeting admission requirements
- Apply towards graduation requirements

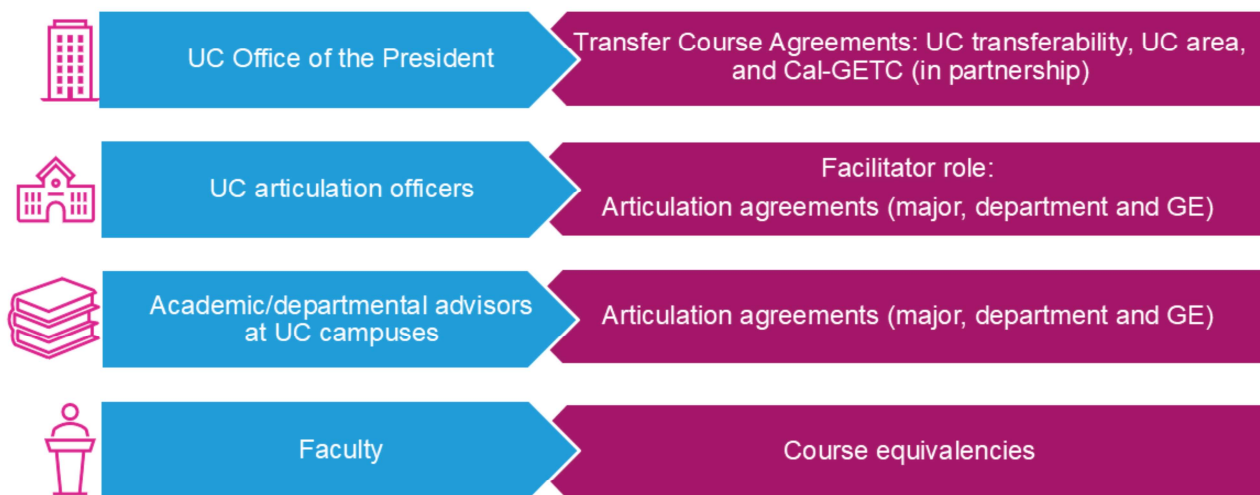
Articulated

- Count towards meeting admission requirements and equivalent to major courses at UCs
- Apply towards major degree requirements

A transferable course is a course that counts for credit to meet admission requirements and provides credit once a student transfers and gets some sort of degree audit. These credits can apply towards GE or elective credits needed for graduation.

An articulated course is a course that has been determined by a college or university to be equivalent to, or an appropriate substitution for, a course at their campus. Articulation is very important when it comes to major preparation, as this is often very campus specific. Articulated courses will provide credit to specific major pre-requisite courses, which is part of their degree requirements.

Levels of review



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There are various levels of review and many are involved to make this process as seamless as possible. CCC courses must be submitted by the CCC AO for review. Courses are then reviewed by UCOP to establish transfer course agreements (TCAs), Cal-GETC reviews happen later and in partnership with the CSUCO. Once TCAs are established, the courses can then go to UC campuses for review. At the UC, this process is facilitated by the campus articulation officer and depending on campus, other folks like academic/department advisors can also support. Ultimately faculty are the ones that determine course equivalencies.

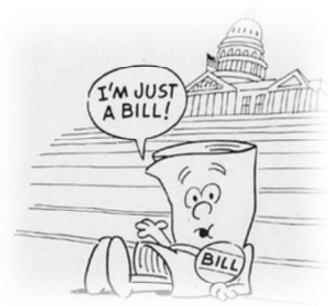

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Background: Transfer articulation review cycles

JUNE – SEPTEMBER

- UC Transfer Course Agreement (TCA) submission and review
- UC transferability
- UC eligibility area approval (7-course pattern)
- Appeals: October 1 – 10

DECEMBER – APRIL/MAY

- Cal-GETC submission and review
- Fulfillment of Cal-GETC general education area (Cal-GETC Standards)
- Areas 1 – 6
- Appeals: June 1 – 10

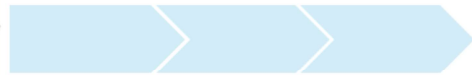


A bit of background; the systemwide transfer articulation process happens in distinct annual cycles – courses are reviewed by UC for baseline UC transferability and UC eligibility areas between June – September each year; and they are reviewed jointly with UC, CSU and CCC representatives for Cal-GETC approval between December – May each year.

The starting point: Course outline of record

The CCC articulation officer submits a **course outline of record (COR)** which includes:

- a) Course identifiers
- b) Dates of approval and effective term
- c) Course description including lecture and/or lab hours, and prerequisites
- d) Course objectives and course content
- e) Methods of instruction and evaluation
- f) Texts and readings
- g) Assignments



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The CCC articulation officer submits a **course outline of record (COR)**: The CCC AO prepares the course, usually supported by curriculum and faculty committees. The UCOP Transfer Articulation team review the outline of record. Utilizing the Regulations by Subject area, which are faculty criteria set by BOARS, the outline is reviewed.

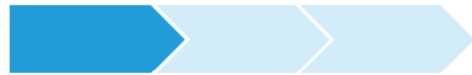
The review: UC transferability



The Transfer Articulation team at UCOP reviews the COR for **Transfer Course Agreements** (TCAs):

- UC transferability
- UC area designation (7-course pattern)

Resources used: Regulations by subject area established by BOARS, course catalogs and course outlines



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UCOP oversees TCAs and UC eligibility areas.

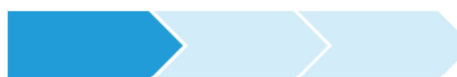
TCAs are the baseline for establishing transferability of community college courses to UC. Courses approved for the TCA count as advanced standing elective credit toward an undergraduate degree at any UC campus and may also be submitted for campus-specific articulation or for Cal-GETC.

UC reviews and updates TCAs annually.

Transfer Course Agreement (TCA) policy

A course may be **transferable** if it is appropriate for a university degree in terms of depth, scope, and rigor. A course that is comparable to a lower-division course offered at one or more UC campuses is transferable.

These guidelines should be used in conjunction with the general criteria contained within UC's Transfer Credit Practices



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UC articulation analysts review TCA submissions in accordance with policies established by the Board of Admissions and Relations with Schools (BOARS) — a committee of the UC Academic Senate charged with developing undergraduate admissions requirements — and regulations governing the maximum amount of credit allowed in certain subject areas (e.g., Physical Education, English as a Second Language).

UC staff uses course catalogs, course outlines, regulations established by BOARS (and recommendations developed by UC faculty and deans).

BOARS policies determine which courses can be accepted for advanced standing elective credit toward a university degree.

- Guidelines pertain to lower-division courses being evaluated for transfer credit to the University of California.
- A course that is comparable to a lower-division course offered at one or more UC campuses is transferable. Alternately, a course may be transferable if it is appropriate for a university degree in terms of depth, scope, and rigor. the outline must show that the course is taught at the depth scope and rigor of a college level course. Articulation is an art, not a science and UC is looking for courses that teach theory over practical application. We refer to the subject areas a lot.
 - Depth: Intended function of the course. This would be somewhat recognizable as something that an undergrad would take (lower-div)
 - Scope: Demonstrably teachable within the timeframe
 - Rigor: Pre or co-requisites/course content

UC's Transfer Credit Practices

Courses determined to be essentially the same as courses offered for an undergraduate degree at any UC campus will be awarded credit if the course:



Is listed in the institution's catalog during the correct academic year



Includes the same or similar content



Requires the same or similar prerequisite coursework



Is offered at the same level of instruction

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The subject area regulations guidelines should be used in conjunction with the general criteria contained within UC's transfer credit practices:

- TCA Policy aligns with these credit practices
- While UC does not articulate coursework with any other college or university, these general guidelines can help determine UC-transferability

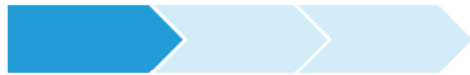

Regulations by subject area

- Subject areas are listed alphabetically
- Guidelines pertain to lower division courses and contain detailed information on what makes a course transferable or non-transferable
 - Can includes details on pre-requisites and/or laboratory or field component



Articulation is an art, not a science. The regulations are used in conjunction with several resources to make transferability determinations.



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Special regulations for courses in specific subject areas, listed alphabetically.
The guidelines pertain to lower-division courses being evaluated for transfer credit to the University of California.

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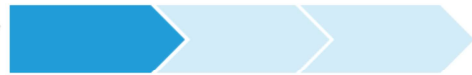

Regulation by subject area example: Social sciences

Transferable courses:

- Academic in content, focusing on research, theory, and analysis.
- Topics covered are integrated into the larger academic context of the course and do not simply consist of a list of isolated topics.
- Methods of assessment include a final exam or paper counting for a substantial part of the student's grade.



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Each regulation area provides details on what makes courses transferable. There may also be specific guidance on non-transferable courses. There may also be details on acceptable course examples and limits on credits. Science courses with lab must include a lab manual or other specific textbook requirements.

Common UC limitations

PE activity courses are limited to 4 semester/6 quarter units

PE theory courses are limited to 8 semester/12 quarter units

College algebra and pre-calculus combined are limited to one course or the other

Statistics is limited to one course

ESL is limited to 8 semester/12 quarter units

College counseling is limited to 3 semester/4.5 quarter units

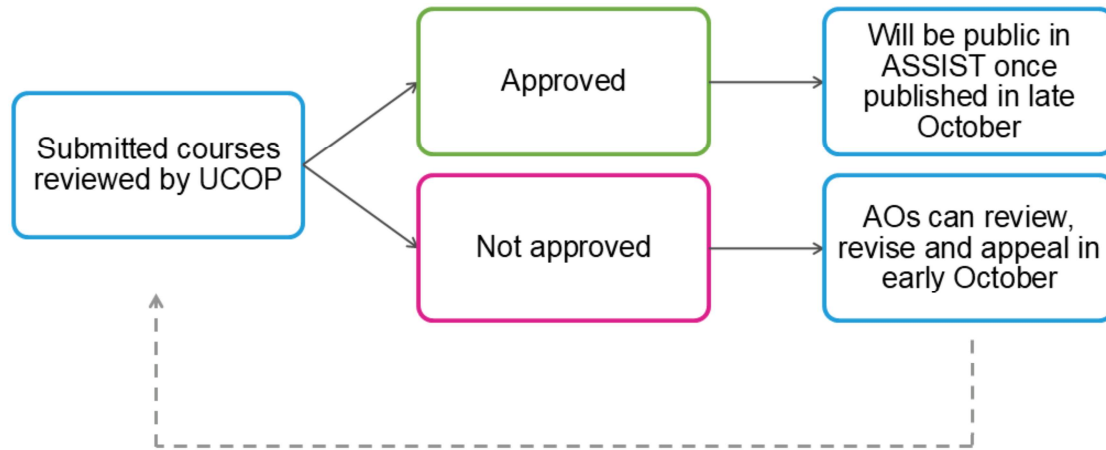
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We wanted to highlight common UC credit limitations since we mentioned that these are considered in the review process.

UC transferability review



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Courses denied transferability will show in workflow with a brief explanation of the reason for the denial (e.g. "no comparable course" or "textbooks must be no more than seven years old").

The review: Cal-GETC

- Standards include details on courses that can be used for Cal-GETC
- Courses must be both CSU and UC transferable
- Section 9 provides details on subject areas and course guidelines



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Cal-GETC review happens separately and courses must be approved for the TCA to be considered for Cal-GETC. All Cal-GETC courses are therefore UC-transferable, but not all Cal-GETC courses will have a UC area designation (7-course pattern).

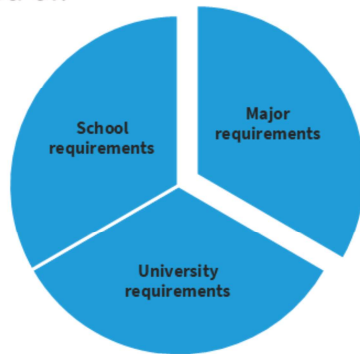
During this time UCOP is a partner in CalGETC review with the CSUCO.

The Cal-GETC Standards are essential in this process. The Standards are developed by the Intersegmental Council of the Academic Senates (ICAS) with representation from CSU, UC and the CCCs. These standards dictate what courses can be used to satisfy Cal-GETC areas.

Section 9 of the Standards provides details on subject areas and course guidelines.

Background: Bachelor's degrees at UC

A bachelor's degree at UC is comprised of:



Major requirements:

- **Lower-division courses**
- Upper-division courses

Major articulation!

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A bachelor's degree at UC is comprised of:

- School requirements (GE)
 - Each undergraduate student must satisfy the degree requirements for the major and, if applicable, the minor or concentration selected.
- University requirements
 - The Entry Level Writing Requirement (ELWR) is a graduation requirement for the University of California. Every undergraduate must demonstrate proficiency in writing. The Entry Level Writing requirement may be satisfied prior to enrollment.
 - American History and Institutions
 - Units
 - Grade requirements (2.0)
 - Residence requirement – a minimum number of units completed at the UC campus.
 - For example, at UCI at least 36 of the final 45 units completed by a student for the bachelor's degree must be earned in residence at the UCI campus and 50% or more of the total quarter units must be earned at UCI.
- Major requirements
 - Lower and upper division courses

The review: Campus articulation



The articulation officer at a UC campus facilitates the course review process for **articulation agreements**:

- Department agreements
 - Course-to-course articulation
- General education

Resources used:

- Campus-specific criteria
- Faculty guidance



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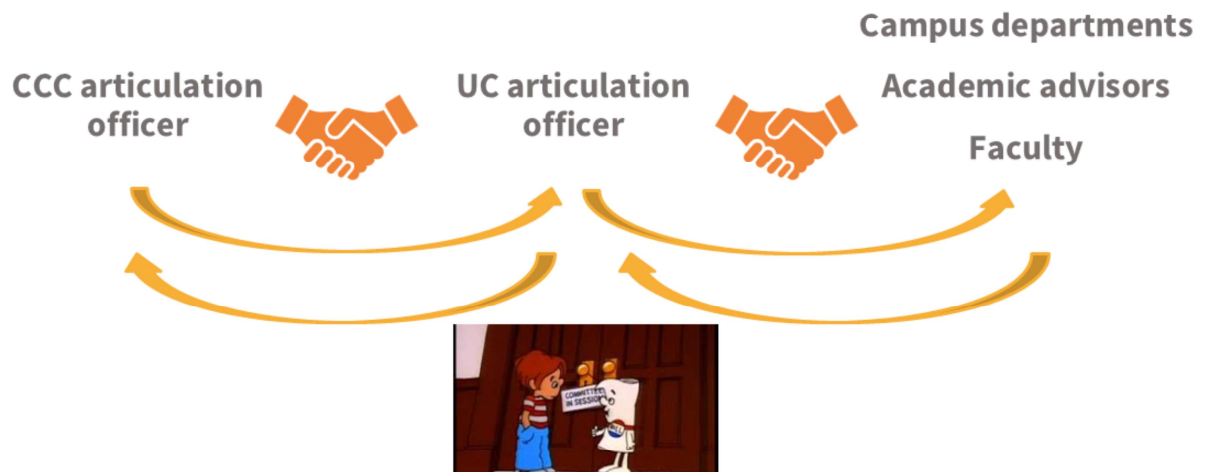
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All articulation agreements begin as department agreements. That is the way the ASSIST platform is built. Then, for a given major, wherever that university course is utilized for major prep, that department articulation agreement will appear. The articulation agreements are not major specific, they **are department specific and apply broadly to all majors that use those same university courses as part of the major prep.**

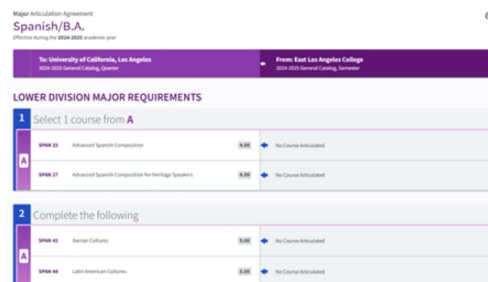
A collaborative process



Major articulation baseline

Articulation officers utilize the lower-division major courses to establish articulation agreements.

- Required or recommended for admission
- Degree requirements to graduate



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Articulation officers utilize the lower-division major courses to establish major preparation agreements.

Courses may be required for admission, some may be recommended for admission. Regardless, they are requirements for the major that must be completed for the degree.

UC-transferable but not articulated

Simply put, faculty have reviewed the course and do not see it comparable to the courses they are teaching at their campus.

It's possible you'd see courses that seem like they would be sufficient, but the authority rests with faculty.



The end point: ASSIST

Transfer Course Agreements and **articulation agreements** provide students and counselors essential information for UC admission.

Importance of a course's journey for UC transfer

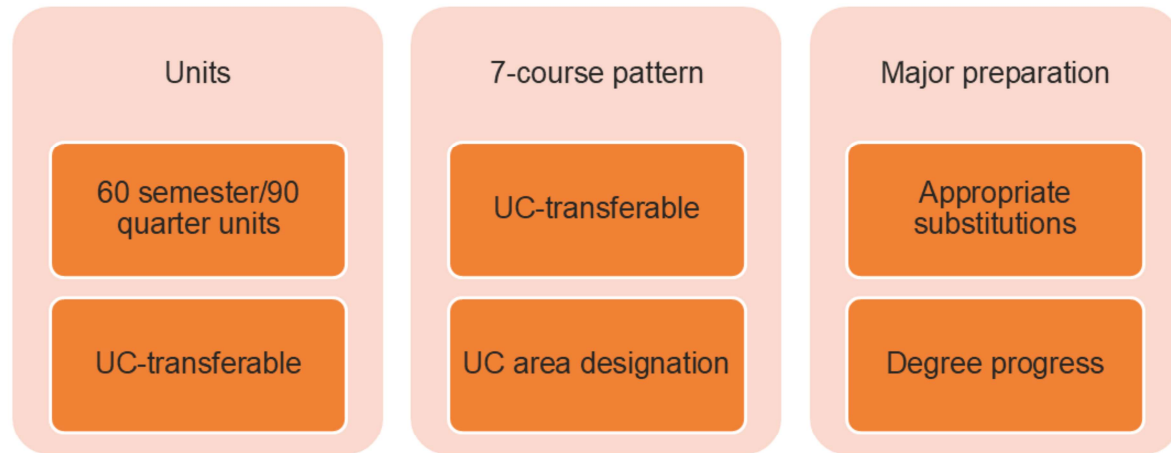
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Admission relies on TCAs and articulation



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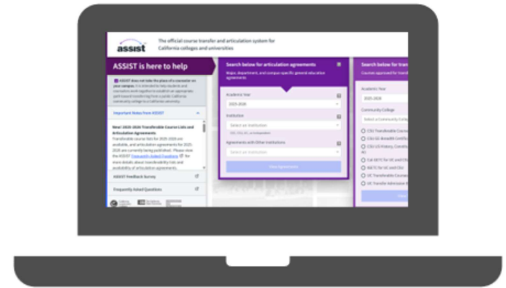
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Successfully meeting admission requirements can only be achieved if students are taking UC-transferable courses, and of those courses, enough that meet the 7-course pattern. Our unit requirement is also specific to UC-transferable units, being aware of units being awarded (along with any limits to those units) is important. For transfer students, major preparation is essential to transfer, sometimes specifically required. Taking properly articulated courses for major preparation is important for admission but also for timely degree progress. Major preparation courses may or may not be required for admission, but they are courses that students will eventually need to take for their degree.

ASSIST as a resource

- A central source and a wealth of information
- Very important for the transfer process
- Imports transferability information into the **UC Transfer Admission Planner** (UC TAP) and the **UC application**

IMPORTANT

This agreement lists courses transferable for unit credit at all UC campuses.

It is based on information from the current California community college catalog and is valid for the academic year indicated at the top of this agreement.

Courses marked with "UC-" will satisfy the five areas of the seven-course requirements:

E = English, M = Math, H = Humanities, B = Behavioral and Social Sciences, S = Biological and Physical Sciences.

INFORMATION ABOUT UC'S TRANSFERABLE COURSE AGREEMENTS

Honors Course Credit Limitation

- Duplicate credit will not be awarded for both the honors and the regular versions of a course.
- Credit will be awarded only to the first course completed with a grade of C or better.

Course Repeatability

- An "ea" after the unit value of a course on this agreement is meant to indicate that the course may be repeated for credit under CCC campus policies.
- Since campus policies on repeatability vary, the "ea" indicator does not guarantee that UC will grant credit for every course that appears multiple times on a student's transcript. See the UC TCA for possible credit limitations.

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Once you select the department or prefix, further information will appear in your search result. The details here are important and appear with every list.

First, we want to highlight that the agreement will show courses transferable for unit credit at ALL UC campuses.

Then, we see that there is reference to meeting UC's 7-course pattern.

And last, there is other information displayed that is important to keep in mind. Typically, these details are about credit limits and repeatability.

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


Once you select your search, in this example we selected the Communication department at this college, you will see the full list of UC-transferable courses at the college. If a course is not listed here, then it means it is not UC-transferable. On the right-hand side of the search results, we see three columns that contain helpful information. First, the search results display whether a course meets an IGETC area, how many units it is worth, and if it meets a UC area, or part of the 7-course pattern.

This is a good example of a department that has a good amount of UC-transferable courses, but if you notice, only one of these courses can meet part of the 7-course pattern. If you are working with a student that wants to take these courses, just be aware that while most of these courses grant units to reach the unit requirement, they should have other courses in their schedule that meet the rest of the 7-course pattern.

Note: This report currently shows IGETC areas and there are plans for Cal-GETC areas to be displayed here in the future. For now, to review Cal-GETC lists, click on the Cal-GETC report option.

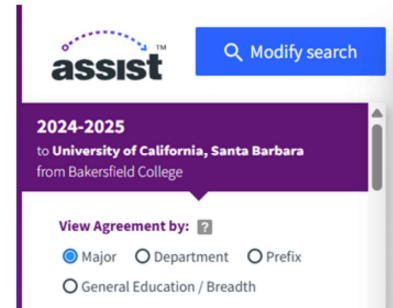

Many choices, which to choose?

- **Major:** Major preparation, or CCC courses that will satisfy major requirements
- **Department:** Course-to-course articulations or series articulations
- **Prefix:** A preference! Will also display course-to-course articulations or series articulations
- **General education:** Not all campuses have GE information, but can be helpful for students looking to meet campus-specific GE



Users can view articulation agreements through various options. The choice may come down to purpose or preference.

Users can now also filter based on the CCC course, but they must be in the “department” radio button to access that feature.

IMPORTANT MAJOR INFORMATION



There is no prerequisite course work required for admission to the Sociology major. The School of Social Sciences recommends that students complete IGETC prior to transfer and refer to the list of courses below that will fulfill UCI lower-division major requirements.

While not a requirement for admission purposes, all School of Social Sciences majors must satisfy a Mathematics Requirement and a computer education course. For full details, students should refer to the [UCI General Catalogue](#).

Students have three options for completing the Mathematics Requirement before enrolling at UCI:

- 1) One semester of calculus (equivalent to UCI's MATH 2A) and one semester of statistics (equivalent to UCI's STATS 7 or MGMT 7) **or**
- 2) Two quarters of calculus (equivalent to UCI's MATH 2A and MATH 2B) and one quarter of statistics (equivalent to UCI's STATS 7 or MGMT 7) **or**
- 3) One year of statistics (equivalent to UCI's SOC SCI 10A, 10B and 10C)

In addition to the School of Social Sciences Math Requirement, all students are required to take course work equivalent to I&C SCI 31 or SOC SCI 3A.

NOTE: In fulfillment of the requirements below, a single course may be used only once.

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It's important to read the details provided. While they may be called "general information" or "Important major information" these are the details UC campuses want students and counselors to review. By not reading these details, you may miss important context. For example, the first thing noted is that for this major "There is no prerequisite course work required for admission to the Sociology major....."

ADMISSION SELECTION CRITERIA - To be admitted to the Pre-Economics major, transfer applicants must complete the following courses with a 2.75 or better grade point average, with no individual grade lower than C (in addition to general admission requirements):

1. **Microeconomics** (the Advanced Placement Microeconomics exam will not satisfy this requirement)
2. **Macroeconomics** (the Advanced Placement Macroeconomics exam will not satisfy this requirement)
3. **Calculus courses articulating with UCSB's MATH 3A-3B or MATH 34A-34B** (a single course articulating with both MATH 34A and 34B is acceptable) **MATH 3A-3B is highly recommended over MATH 34A-34B**

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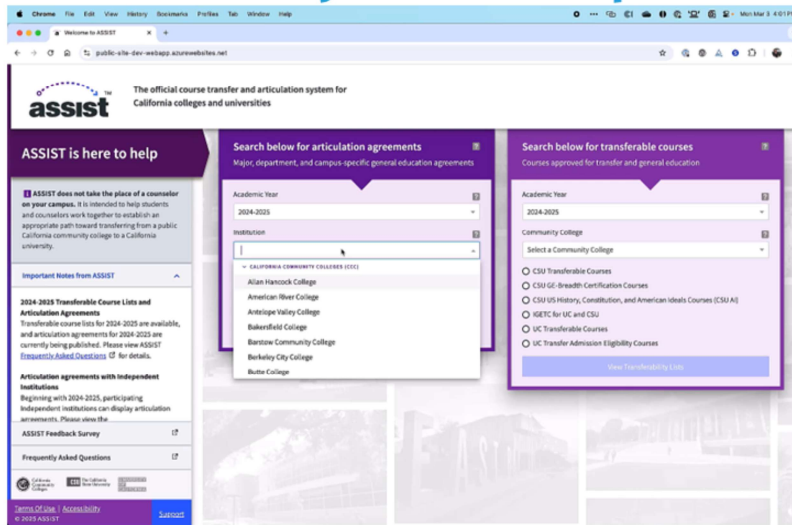
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Campuses may also highlight admission selection criteria, which indicate when a course is required for admission consideration. For example, here we see a major articulation agreement between San Diego Mesa College and UC Santa Barbara for the economics major, “To be admitted to the Pre-Economics major, transfer applicants must complete the following courses with a 2.75 or better grade point average, with no individual grade lower than C....”

Preparation for the major = courses that may be able to be completed at a CCC

- Usually listed in UC course titles and numbers
- Articulation agreement will display appropriate course options, if articulated.

New! Side-by-side comparison



A CCC student wants to compare the same major agreement at two different 4-year institutions.

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Let's see this new option in action.

A CCC student attending Bakersfield College

Wants to compare the agreements at UC Irvine and UC Berkeley to determine the best option

The Agreement Comparison option will display in any solo agreement > notice the blue "compare with another agreement" button in the upper right-hand corner

When selected, a second agreement search box opens, functioning in the exact same way as the one on the assist.org landing page

Selecting a second agreement to view places both agreements side by side to be scrolled and compared

You can modify the search from either agreement to compare either agreement with another or return to single course search

- UC TAP uses **ASSIST verified** information to calculate:

 - Completion of the 7-course pattern

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The UC Transfer Admission Planner is UC's online resources to help transfer students plan and track their transfer. Information from ASSIST is used to provide students accurate academic information.

UC application

- The UC application uses **ASSIST verified** information which helps students enter academic information with ease.
- UC TAP import allows students to import UC TAP academic history into the UC application.



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The UC application uses ASSIST verified information which helps students enter academic information with ease. This allows students to enter academic information accurately and leave less room for error.

If students have a UC TAP account, then there is also an import allows students to import UC TAP academic history into the UC application.

A collaboration between CCCs, UCOP and campuses

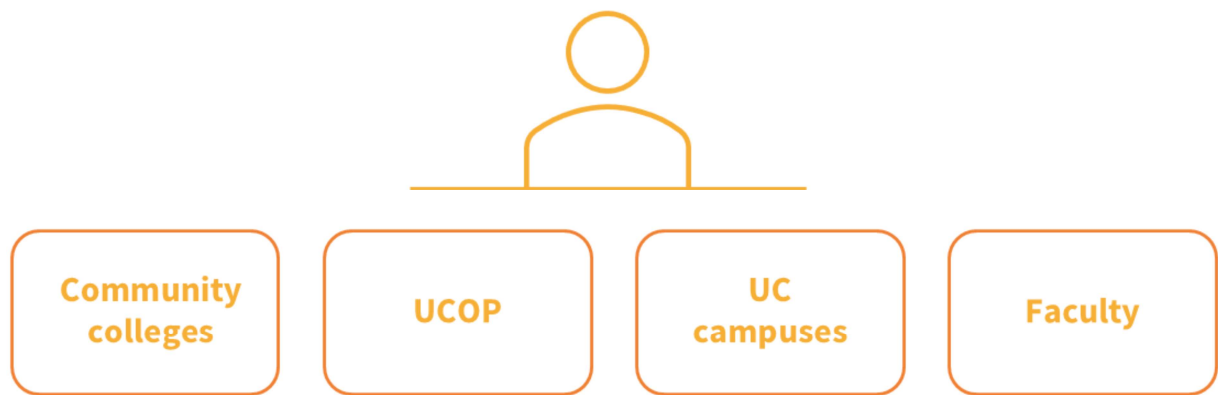

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As you can see, this work is important, and this work is collaborative.

How TCAs support UC transfer

- CCCs offer a large variety of courses, but not all courses are UC-transferable
- Of those UC-transferable courses, not all will meet the 7-course pattern
 - Beyond the 7-course pattern, units can come from major prep, GE or both!
- Footnotes remind us if there are limits on credits
- Taking the correct courses help students meet UC junior transfer admission requirements



How articulation agreements support UC transfer

- Comprehensive review for transfer students draws heavily from academic factors
- Major preparation is one of the most important academic factors
- UC campuses determine their own articulation agreements
- UC campuses have admission representatives that can answer specific questions about articulation agreements

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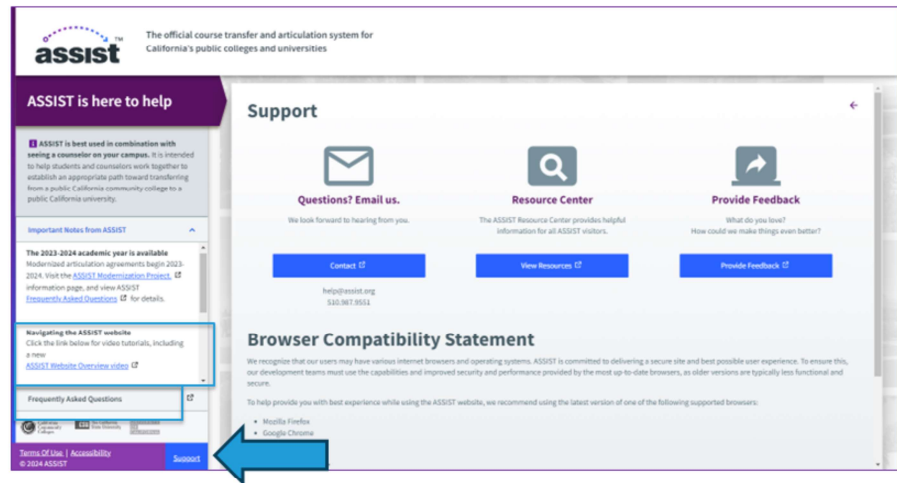
