






For this session we will review the UC Transfer Admission Planner, the UC Information Center and the UC Counselor Resource Library.



The UC TAP Tool is a great resource to help prospective students "prepare" for their next academic adventure. For this first section we will overview student account and counselor account features.




The UC TAP tool is designed for use by students transferring from California community colleges, including those students who are seeking a Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) with one of the six participating UC campuses.

UC TAP helps students plan their coursework and map their progress toward meeting UC minimum requirements

The UC TAP is a place where students can receive important messages regarding upcoming events/visits from UC representatives.

Students may choose the UC application option to import academic information (coursework) from their UC TAP/TAG account to the UC application.




- Navigating the UC TAP tool is very straightforward with sections focused on personal information, academic information, and transfer information.
- A great feature for the students is the Support program section. Students can view available programs and indicate their interests. Additionally, through the "my transfer plan" section, students can indicate the UC campuses and majors they are interested in pursuing.
- Through both the 'support programs' and 'my transfer plan' sections, students may be considered and invited to transfer programs and events, including summer programs, internships, and research opportunities.

How to create a UC TAP account



- Create/login to access UC TAP account for counselors.
- IT Support available if you face any technical issues.
- Counselors must have a unique login for each college they represent, even within the same district



How to access UC TAP


- Access to the UC TAP is determined by designees at individual California community colleges. Only authorized counselors will be granted access to UC TAP, as all information collected in the planning tool is considered confidential.
- Counselors will only have access to the students from the CCC that gave the counselor the TAP account, even though the counselor might work at multiple CCCs.

Counselor Benefits to using the UC TAP include:


- Access to a student's TAP account, easily allows you to see if a student is meeting the UC Transfer admission requirements (GPA, units, etc.)
 - *Please note: that unit and GPA calculations are preliminary and based on student self-reported information
- Counselors can access campus contacts and information regarding UC TAP
 Administrators, UC Campus TAG Contacts, and UC Representative Appointments
- Counselors have the ability to communicate with individual students, as well as send notifications and reminders to specific subgroups of students.
- The UC TAP tool provides counselors with access reports and outcome data from students at your CCC which we will show in more detail in the next slide.



This slide shows a snapshot of the various tools available for counselors with respect to reports and outcome data.

- Student search
- TAG/TAP reports (including status & outcome)
- Student counts by UC campus
- Student counts by UC college/majors
- Student list by UC campus
- UC Dual Admission reports

Counselors have the option to request additional reporting needs or provide feedback and ideas to better improve the TAP and TAG report section.



We will now talk about gathering evidence as a detective using the UC Information Center, or Info Center for short.




The Info Center offers powerful visuals, filters, and reports that can support with being data-informed.

There are two primary ways to navigate the Info Center. The first is to look at the **Quick Links.** Think of it like an evidence board that maps out the bigger picture clues your case is building off.

Quick Links enables users to access specific reports and databases, including:

- The **UC** at a glance report, which provides a snapshot of how UC impacts the lives of people in California and around the world: ucop.edu/institutional-research-academic-planning/files/uc-facts-at-a-glance.pdf
- The UC Accountability Report, which provides an assessment of the UC's progress in meeting key goals: accountability.universityofcalifornia.edu/
- The **More analyses** link takes users to the Institutional Research and Academic Planning Content & Analysis (IRAP) page which includes topic briefs, reports, and analyses that concentrate in key areas of UC: ucop.edu/institutional-research-academic-planning/content-analysis/index.html
- And lastly, the **UC in California map** allows users to explore and visualize the reach of UC's teaching, research, and public service mission geographically: ucop.cisr.ucsc.edu/




The second approach for navigating the Info Center is looking for evidence reports using the **Search Bar** and utilizing key words such as "community college" and "transfer" as depicted on the slide.

Upon a search with these key words, the following relevant reports will populate:

- Admissions by source school provides applicant, admit, and enrollment data: universityofcalifornia.edu/about-us/information-center/admissions-source-school
- California Community College new enrollments shares the enrollees from campuses by year and UC campus: universityofcalifornia.edu/about-us/information-center/california-community-college-new-enrollments-uc
- California community college outreach programs is a portfolio and dashboard that highlights the
 efforts of UC's Transfer Prep Program: <u>universityofcalifornia.edu/about-us/information-center/uc-cccoutreach</u>
- **Enrollment destinations of UC admits** shows the colleges that students admitted to a UC end up enrolling at: <u>universityofcalifornia.edu/about-us/information-center/admit-destinations</u>
- Transfer fall admissions summary details the most recent fall admission data: universityofcalifornia.edu/about-us/information-center/transfer-admissions-summary
- And lastly, Transfers by major provides data on transfer applicants based on their field of study: universityofcalifornia.edu/about-us/information-center/transfers-major

We are going to highlight two of these reports that offer valuable insights to counselors.




If you would like to view and click through the reports yourself, scan the QR codes on the bottom right of the screen for each report.

The first report we want to highlight is the "Admission by source school" report, which presents info on UC's applicants, admits, and enrollees: universityofcalifornia.edu/about-us/information-center/admissions-source-school

As seen on the top of this slide, the report utilizes clickable tabs, and for the purposes of Ensuring Transfer Success, we want to focus on the tabs beginning with capital "TR," which stands for Transfer

Users are able to click the tabs to pull reports on **ethnicity (Eth)**, **gender (Gnd)**, and **mean GPA (GPA)** and filter them **by community college, academic year,** and **UC campus.**

This info is especially helpful for identifying historical trends based on your own campus's data, and counselors have primarily used this report to pull info on students' average GPA as pictured on this slide. As you can also see, we can filter the GPA data by a specific academic year, like 2020-2021, and a specific UC campus, like UCLA for example.



The second report we want to highlight is the "**Transfers by major**" report: <u>universityofcalifornia.edu/aboutus/information-center/transfers-major</u>

Similar to the other report, this one also utilizes tabs that users can click on to filter by **major name**, **federal Classification of Instructional Programs or CIP category**, and **community college**.

We want to preface that this report is based on discipline groupings and cannot separate out specific majors since those aren't always equivalent across campuses. As you explore this data, be advised to use it as a general guide to understand selectivity, not as a predictor of any one student's admission chances to a specific campus major.

With that said, searching **by major name** enables users to compare selected broad disciplines across multiple UC campuses as pictured on this slide.

The **by federal CIP category** tab allows one to compare the selected subfamily across campuses and help users see what majors are included within each discipline.

Lastly, the **by community college** tab allows users to pull info for a specific campus and compare data across multiple academic years.

Now that we've shown you the Info Center and examples of some of existing evidence reports you can utilize, we will now highlight resources from the Counselor Resource Library.






Now, let's shift our focus from gathering data to being an investigator. If you're seeking a reliable way to stay updated on all things related to the UC system, the Counselor Resource Library is a great place to start.



Part of being an investigator means following evidence wherever it leads. The Resource Library is a valuable hub where you can sign up to explore all UC related transfer admission topics. Every campus has created a list with specific resources. In particular, I would like to highlight the transfer credit practices, you can get information on pass-along credit, limits on transfer credit, repeated courses and much more. Just a heads-up, the library is updated throughout the year based on the admissions cycle, so be sure to check back regularly for the latest updates.






