Defining a transfer student





Who is a transfer applicant?

A transfer applicant is a student who has:

- Graduated from, left high school, or equivalent (such as GED or HiSET)
- Enrolled in a regular term at a college or university after high school graduation









- A regular term is defined as Fall, Winter (for quarter institutions), or Spring for a college or university.
- Students who participated in dual enrollment while in high school and have not yet graduated from high school are not considered transfer students.



- Emma: Is not a transfer applicant because she is still in high school and has not yet graduated.
- Tony: Is a transfer applicant because he is enrolled at a community college during a regular term after high school graduation.
- Olivia:
 - Considerations: Unless Olivia had previously completed enough units through dual enrollment, she would not be eligible for transfer admission.
 - The campuses have made an exception to this definition for high school students who graduate mid-year. These students are permitted to enroll in college coursework in the spring term and retain their first-year application status. This exception only applies to students who intend to enroll at UC the following fall. In this case, as long as the student is planning to enroll in fall 2026, they are able to take college coursework in spring 2026 and still be considered as a first-year applicant. They won't be held to transfer admission requirements.

Definition of a California Community College transfer student

Has completed at least 30 semester (45 quarter) UC transferable units at one or more California Community Colleges




Attended a California Community College as their last college in a regular session (fall, winter or spring) before enrolling at a UC campus







- If the student went to a CCC and then transferred to a CSU and then changed their mind and wanted to transfer to a UC, they are no longer defined as a CCC student. This is important because UCs give preference to CCC transfer students.
- A student who began at a UC, attended a CCC, and now wants to return to a UC is considered an intercampus transfer student.
- A student who began their college education at 4-year or out-of-state institution, then attended and is transferring from a CCC based on the definition in the slide above would be considered a CCC transfer.




Additional important dates and deadlines

- December 15: Transfer Academic Update (TAU) opens
- Mid-November: TAG decision notification releases for TAG campuses who conduct preevaluations
- January 31: Priority TAU deadline
- March 15: Transfer Academic Update (TAU) closes
- July 1: deadline for official transcripts
- July 15: deadline for official test scores



- Transfer students must meet the minimum UC transfer admission requirements for junior level transfer
- UC campuses may have additional requirements that vary by major including additional major-specific coursework and/or higher GPA requirements.
- Some UC campuses may accept lower division transfer students.
 - Students should reach out to individual campuses for more information about lower division admission requirements.



- The UC 7 course pattern is a set of general education courses that transfer students must complete to be eligible to transfer to a UC campus for junior-level admission.
- <u>Assist.org</u> can help identify 7 course pattern courses that are offered at California community colleges.
 - Ourse marked with "E", "M", "B", "H", "S" in the "UC Area" column identifies courses that meet the 7 Course Pattern as well as which area it satisfies.
 - E= English Composition
 - M= Mathematical concepts and quantitative reasoning
 - O B= Social and behavioral sciences
 - H= Arts and humanities
 - S= Physical and biological sciences

UC-transferable GPA



GPA vs UC-transferable GPA

 The overall GPA listed on the CCC transcript may be different than an applicant's UC-transferable GPA.

UC-transferable GPA

- Only takes into account grades from UCtransferable courses.
- Non-transferable courses are not calculated into UC transferable GPA.







- Withdrawals (W/EW) grades, repeated courses, No Pass (NP) grades are not calculated in the UC GPA
- Academic renewal (AR) are not calculated in the UC GPA if posted on the student's transcript.

- Completing IGETC/CalGETC is not a requirement for admission, but can be considered by each UC campus as part of selection criteria.
- Major preparation is not a UC transfer admission requirement; however, many majors do requirement major preparation for admission.
 - Major prep requirements vary by campus and major and therefore considered as selection criteria.
- While all applicant are required to submit responses to the UC personal insight
 questions, each campus may considered the PIQs differently within the selection

- The UC 7-course pattern is part of the minimum UC transfer admissions requirements for junior-level applicants.

 This holistic approach assesses multiple facets of an applicant's academic and personal achievements, considering them within the context of the opportunities available to the student. The goal is to identify individuals who can contribute meaningfully to the university's intellectual community.

The UC undergraduate admission process does not discriminate against, or provide preferential treatment to, any individual on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity or national origin, consistent with federal and state law.

Major preparation

Major preparation (or "major prep") for transfer students refers to completing specific lower-division courses that are required or strongly recommended for a student's intended major before transferring to UC.



UC Riverside Major Preparation Guide, Business Administration Major







- Each campus has their own version of major prep, students should utilize <u>assist.org</u> for the selective major's articulation agreements.
- Student who plan to use non-CCC courses to meet major prep requirements may refer to individual campus websites to Assist articulation agreements to view course requirements; however, course-to-course articulation is not guaranteed.

IGETC and Cal-GETC



Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC)

- A series of courses a CCC student can complete to satisfy most or all general education requirements prior to transferring to UC
- IGETC for STEM
 - Available to students pursuing a STEM major.
 - Student plans to earn an associate degree for transfer (ADT) with an IGETC for STEM option.
 - UC major program accepts partial IGETC (may vary)

California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC)

 A singular set of courses a CCC student can complete to satisfy most or all general education requirements prior to transferring to UC or CSU







- Transfer student can follow one of two ways to to satisfy general educations requirements.
 - o IGETC/Cal-GETC or UC breadth requirements
- Completion of general education requirements is not an admissions requirement; however, completion can be considered for campus selection.
- IGETC/Cal-GETC is typically not recommended for STEM-relatated majors.
 - Students pursuing STEM majors are strongly encouraged to prioritize major preparation requirements for admission to UC.
- IGETC for STEM majors: Chemistry, Biology, and Environmental Sciences

IGETC vs Cal-GETC

IGETC

- For students enrolled in community college prior to fall 2025
- Some course variation for students transferring to a UC compared to CSU
- Language Other than English required for UC

IGETC & Cal-GETC

- Not required for admission
- Recommended for some majors
- Includes an Ethnic Studies requirement
- Certified by the CCC

Cal-GETC

- For students entering community college in fall 2025 and beyond
- One set of courses for CSU and UC
- Removed Language Other than English Requirement (LOTE)

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- Cal-GETC courses taken fall 2025 or later may be applied toward IGETC certification if approved for the corresponding area.
- IGETC courses taken prior to fall 2025 may be applied toward Ca-GETC if approved for the corresponding area.
- LOTE: student can complete LOTE requirement after transfer per UC campus program and graduation requirements.

- Transfers applicants can only TAG to one UC campus; however, they may apply to multiple campuses on the UC application.
- Submission of the TAG application is done through the UC Transfer Admission Planner (UC TAP) during the designated filing periods.
- Not all majors at each individual campus may be available for TAG

Evaluation basics





Transferability

California community college (CCC) courses:

- Students and counselors may utilize Assist to determine if a course is UC transferable for a specific academic year.
- Transferability does not always equal articulation.
 - Use the articulation agreements on Assist to determine which CCC courses articulate to a specific UC campus courses.

Non-California community college courses:

- Transferability is determined after a student has applied to UC.
- Non-CCC courses reviewed and determined to be essentially the same as courses offered for an undergraduate degree at any UC campus are typically transferable.
 - See UC's Transfer Credit Practices






- PE theory courses are typically identified with a + notation on <u>Assist.org</u>
- PE Activity courses are typically identified with a * notation on <u>Assist.org</u>
- ESL= English as a second language
- Credit is awarded in a manner that most benefits the student toward meeting UC admission requirements and campus selection criteria.

Credit limitation examples

Statistics courses often have limits with other statistics courses in other departments.

There is a limit on how many guidance/counseling units a student will receive credit for.








- Symbol that appear next to a course on Assist indicate that a credit limitation is associated with the course.
- Check the footnotes on Assist for additional information about the limitation.
- Example: Statistics
 - If a student completes more than one Statistics courses listed in the footnotes of the TCA on Assist, the student will be awarded credit for only one course.
 - Credit is award for the course that benefits the student most for admission eligibility.
- Example: Counseling and guidance courses
 - If a student completes more that one college counseling or guidance courses, a maximum of 3 semester units will be award for the combination of courses completed.
 - Credit is award for the course(s) that benefits the student most for admission eligibility.



- Sequential subject build on content from the previous lower-level course. As a result, students should advance within the sequence in order based on published prerequisites within the course descriptions.
- Students should repeat sequential subject courses where a non-passing grade (C-, D, D-, or F) was earned before completing next course in the sequence.
- Examples:
 - Math: Precalculus → Calculus 1 → Calculus 2
 - Language other than English (LOTE): Spanish 1→ Spanish 2→ Intermediate
 Spanish 1→ Intermediate Spanish 2
 - Chemistry: General Chemistry 1→ General Chemistry 2→ Organic Chemistry 1→ Organic Chemistry 2



- Example: Riverside City College credit limitations for Chemistry
 - If a student completes any combination of CHE 2A, CHE 3, and/or CHE 10, credit is only awarded for one course.
 - If a student completed an introductory Chemistry course after completing a college-level General Chemistry course, credit is not awarded for the introductory course.

Academic renewals

- Students may elect to have previously completed courses excluded in the computation of their cumulative grade point average (GPA).
- Academic renewal is not the same as repeating a course
- Approved academic renewal courses will have a special notation on the CCC transcripts.
- Courses should be marked as 'AR' on the UC application










- Students must petition or apply for academic renewal at their community college.
 - Requirements to receive approval for academic renewal may vary by campus.
- Students who have petitioned for academic renewal but have not received approval from their community college should report the original grade on their UC application.
- UC will honor academic renewals when posted to the student's official transcript/academic record.



Los Angeles Community College District example:

 A specific notation of "Academic Renewal" is posted under the course title of the specific course with F grade still visible transcript.

Irvine Valley College example:


• Utilized an "@" symbols with an associated legend to identify courses where academic renewal has been granted.

Withdrawals

Courses marked as 'Withdrawal' or 'Excused Withdrawal' have no grade point value and are not included in the GPA calculation.

However...

Failure to withdraw and unauthorized withdrawals are considered 'F' grades.



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Language of instruction (LOI)



- No lower-division credit is awarded for language acquisition courses or AP language exams and college LOTE courses if the language was the same as the language of instruction in all of the 9th grade or beyond.
- College credit for literature courses taught in the language of instruction is allowed.

Example:

Olivia completed 9th and 10th grade in Spanish. Therefore, she
is not eligible to receive UC credit for Spanish language courses
taken at a CCC or for the AP Spanish Language exam. However,
UC credit may be awarded for the AP Spanish Literature exam or
for UC-transferable Spanish literature courses.





Limitations on lower division units

Students are granted up to 70 semester/105 quarter UC-transferable units for lower division coursework at any institution or combination of institutions.

- Excludes units completed at a UC campus or UC Extension
- Excludes AP, IB, and/or A level examinations
- All CCC units are lower division
- Lower division units completed beyond maximum limitation does not impact eligibility for admission.

<u>Note:</u> Upper division units deemed UC-transferable may result in excessive units and potentially impact an applicant's eligibility.









- All lower division units completed from any institution are added together.
- If the total number of units exceeds 70 semester/ 105 quarter units the lower division limitation is applied.
- Upper division units and UC units (including lower division units) are added to the lower division unit total.
 - Admission eligibility for high-unit juniors and/or seniors varies by campus.

Lower division unit limitation

Examples:

| Moreno Valley College + | 5 semester/7.5 quarter units |

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Example 1:

- Add up all units for a total of 92 semester units/138 quarter units
- Because all units completed are lower division, the maximum number of units awarded is 70 semester/105 quarter units.
- Student is not at risk of excessive units

Example 2:

- Add up all lower division units for a total of 84 semester/126 quarter units
- Apply the lower division unit maximum for a total of 70 semester/105 quarter units of lower division awarded
- Add the upper division units to the lower division unit total for an overall total of 88 semester/132 quarter units
- Student may be at risk of excessive units and may required additional review by the dean during the application process (varies by college)

UC Transfer Admission Planner (UC TAP)

UC TAP is a free, online tool designed for prospective transfer students to track and plan their coursework as they prepare to transfer



- Free online tool for California Community College students
- Designed to track and plan coursework for UC transfer
- Required to apply for a UC Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG)







UC TAP is a free, online tool designed for prospective transfer students to track and plan their coursework as they prepare to transfer from a California Community College to a University of California (UC) campus.

Why should students use UC TAP?

- Academic Planning: Helps students map out UC transfer requirements and ensure they're on the right track for their intended major.
- Progress Tracking: Students can save and update their coursework and grades over time.
- TAG Submission: Students must use UC TAP to apply for a Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) to six UC campuses.
- Direct Support: Some UC campuses may use TAP information to reach out with helpful resources, events, or early advising

It fosters joint academic planning between students and counselors, reducing transfer missteps and ensures students' academic history is organized in one place, helping avoid lost information or inconsistencies when applying.

The Transfer Pathways can help students who want to make themselves competitive across the UC system






ADT=Associate degree for transfer

ADT to UC

Advising students for UC transfer on an ADT pathway:

- ADTs often meet minimum UC transfer admission requirements.
- May be a viable option for students who wish to apply to both UC and CSU for a non-selecting UC major.
- ADTs may satisfy some or all major prep for selective majors.
 - Students may choose to complete required UC major prep in addition to ADT requirements.
 - Refer to Assist for campus specific major preparation requirements.

ASSIST.org is California's official transfer and articulation system

- Assist provides accurate, updated info on CCC courses transferable to UC & CSU.
- Free, public tool used by students and counselors to explore:
 - Course transferability (UC-transferable)
 - · Major preparation by campus
 - Articulation agreements by major or department







ASSIST.org helps clarify which community college courses will transfer to which UC or CSU campuses.

It's the *go-to resource* for exploring **course articulation**, **general education breadth**, and **major prep requirements**.

It's especially important for students planning to transfer with specific major goals—like Computer Science or Psychology—as prep varies by UC campus.

Site is updated **annually**, so always ensure you're using the correct academic year (e.g., 2024–2025).

Transferability means the units will be accepted at a UC for credit, often toward eligibility or GE requirements.

ASSIST helps students plan which CCC courses will satisfy UC-M (Math) or UC-E (English) subject areas.

It also lists all UC-transferable CCC courses, so students and counselors can confirm credit will be earned.

Highly useful for building a transfer plan that includes both eligibility and competitive major prep.

Articulation agreements



Articulation = how CCC courses fulfill UC major/breadth requirements.

- Campus-specific: agreements differ between UCs.
- 3 types of articulation info:
 - GE/Breadth agreements
 - · Course-to-course equivalencies
 - Lower-division major prep

Must check each UC campus individually







- Articulation ensures students are meeting **specific course requirements** for admission and success in their major.
- Each UC evaluates CCC courses independently—so major prep for "Biology" at UCLA may differ from UCSB.
- Agreements are searchable by major or department.
- For impacted majors, articulation lists may also highlight **selection criteria** like minimum GPA or specific course grades.

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


