UC priorities for increasing transfer

- The University seeks to maintain its systemwide enrollment ratio of two California freshmen for every California resident transfer student (2:1).
- Despite high rates of admission (76%) and success with graduation and time to degree, only a small segment of community colleges are fully represented.
- Improving transfer rates requires serving all 115 campus-based CCCs while focusing on regions underserved by UC in order to increase the system's racial and ethnic diversity and contribute to State goals for increasing bachelor degree attainment.

- Desired outcome: Increased transfer preparation and successful CCC>UC transfer








Research

Strategy 1: Promote greater awareness of transfer opportunity

- Identify high school students who intend to enroll in one of the 69 targeted CCCs and provide direct communications from UC
 - Clear information about preparation, admission and financial aid
- Identify first year community college students who intend to transfer to a four-year university and provide outreach and academic preparation activities at their colleges
 - Individual and group advising, summer programs, UC campus visits
- Provide professional growth opportunities and other resources for counselors and advisors
 - Augmented opportunities, e.g., ETS, webinars, informational materials







Strategy 2: Link awareness to action

- Centralize UC's currently decentralized transfer preparation opportunities, programs, information and planning tools on a comprehensive, studentfocused transfer website
- Provide linkages to academic advising and online courses through the site
- Aid students in understanding how their course-taking maps to four-year degrees
