Starting the application

Create an account


EMAIL

Students will use this email throughout the UC application process so they should choose an email they use frequently!

PASSWORD

Keep the application password secure. It must include:

- Uppercase and lowercase letters
- A number
- A special character










Selecting term & level

California Community College students with only CCC coursework should choose junior-level transfer even if their total units seem excessive.

There is a limit on how many units can transfer (not courses, but units).

Students with past UC units and/or other university upper-division units are the only students who can be above the junior-level.


Citizenship and residency

Citizenship

- All applicants must select a country of citizenship
- U.S. citizens will have a follow-up question about tribal affiliation to help determine eligibility for the Native American Opportunity Program (NAOP)
- Non-U.S. citizens will be asked further questions regarding visa status

Undocumented & DACA participating applicants

- Applicants should select "No Selection"
- Applicants should leave SSN blank (or include SSN for work purposes or ITIN)
- This information is confidential and encrypted, regardless of citizenship status









Statement of Legal Residence

All applicants are required to indicate whether or not they would like to be evaluated for CA residency for tuition purposes.

- This section does not impact an admission decision.
- A series of questions will follow to help determine residency for tuition.

About you

Statement of Legal Residence



To determine your University of California (UC) tuition, applicants must indicate if they would like to be evaluated for a Residence Classification via the Statement of Legal Residence (SLR). You must meet UC requirements to qualify for in-state tuition, regardless of your classification in another system. Parents is defined as natural or adoptive parents, not stepparent. Your answer below has no bearing on your admissions decision.

The following three requirements must be established more than 365 days immediately prior to the residence determination date:

- Physical Presence You and your parents must be physically present in California. If you
 moved to California primarily to attend the University of California or another school, you
 are ineligible for a Resident classification for tuition purposes.
- Intent to remain in California You and your parents must have established your intent to make California your permanent home and must have relinquished ties to any prior place of residence outside of California.
- Immigration status You and your parents must be citizens or permanent residents of the United States or be present under a valid I-94 for an eligible visa, and have held that immigration status.

Applicants who do not satisfy all three parts may qualify for a Special Circumstance, Exemption, or Waiver provision (such as an <u>AB 540</u> [2] nonresident supplemental tuition exemption) and will be asked to submit additional supplemental information at a future date. For further explanation, read the full <u>UC Residence Policy and Guidelines</u> [2].

Note: Undocumented students should use these instructions [2] for completing the SLR.



- Data can be exported directly from TAP to the UC application
 - Applicants should verify all information is correct after exporting from UC TAP
 - After the initial UC TAP export, any changes to colleges, courses, grades, etc., must be made directly in the UC application




Test scores

Applicants should enter any AP or IB scores they may have.

Students whose language of instruction in 9th grade or higher was not English and who are not native speakers are required to self-report scores from an acceptable English language proficiency test (TOEFL, IELTS, or DET)

Exam scores can only help students in the application to meet eligibility and/or unit requirements.









Activities & awards


There is nothing in this section that can directly harm a student's chances of admission.

Applicants should describe the focus of the program, their experiences, accomplishments and what they learned throughout.

Applicants should focus on post-high school activities.

Context is considered when reviewing this section.

Sections	Examples	Creative Tips
Award or Honor	 Academic excellence awards Outstanding service awards Research or capstone project Scholarships 	Have your student think about awards or honors in the context of their whole lives. For example, if a student doesn't have an outstanding service award, they should consider other honors they have received for service, like employee of the month.
Educational Preparation Programs	 Transfer preparation programs MESA, Puente, Umoja, EOPs, 1st Year Learning Communities, etc. 	If your student hasn't participated, what opportunities have they utilized? Have they developed a working relationship with a counselor?
Extracurricular Activity	 Student government Clubs and organizations Performing arts Childcare and/or family care 	These could include hobbies, clubs, sports or anything else. If a student claims they do not do anything, have them consider what they use their free time for.

Sections	Examples	Creative Tips
Volunteering/Community Service	 Community service organizations Tutoring and mentoring programs Family responsibilities / Childcare 	Have your student think about things they have done that they were not paid for. Do they help their parents on weekends with childcare? Do they assist elderly family or community members?
Work Experience	 Research assistantships Part-time or full-time jobs (employee of the month, etc.) Internships 	This section helps us understand students' responsibilities professionally through work or academically through internships.

You can apply to a number of UC scholarships (that means free money) right here in the application. The scholarships listed below are awarded to students with specific backgrounds, academic interests or career objectives. If you don't see any categories that are relevant to you, don't worry. In addition to these scholarships, each campus and many alumni associations award a variety of scholarships that recognize students' achievement and potential.

You'll also need to file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) [2] or a California
Dream Act Application [2] (if you're an undocumented student) to be considered for every type of financial aid possible, including the scholarships listed below. International students should not file these.

Personal Insight Questions (PIQs)

PIQ responses provide the opportunity for students to advocate for themselves in the UC application. Each question is relevant to the selection criteria of each UC campus.

Please note the following:

There is one required question all transfer students must answer

Transfer students will then choose 3 more questions to answer from the remaining 7

All questions have equal value

There is no wrong way to answer a PIQ







Additional comments

- Changes in family circumstances
- How the student plans to engage with the UC community if admitted
- Add context to something that briefly appears earlier on the application
- This section may be left blank

If there's anything else you want us to know about you, now's your chance. But remember, you should use this space only if you want to describe anything that you have not had the opportunity to include elsewhere in the application. This shouldn't be an essay, but rather a place to explain unusual personal or family circumstances, or anything that may be unclear in other parts of the application.

Friendly reminders

- Validate your students' experiences.
- There is no perfect formula for a "strong" PIQ response.
- Encourage students to make use of all narrative components of the UC application.
- There is a misconception that students are not allowed to write about their identities, ideals, values, or beliefs.
 - While not true, it is more important to focus on how these have impacted, or why they are important to, the student.








Review & submit

Submit between October 1 and November 30

Fee waiver is calculated automatically

Applicants will know they submitted successfully when they:

- Pay \$80 per campus (\$95 for international students) unless they qualify for fee waiver (4 free applications)
- Receive a UC application ID number and email confirmation
