





Participating in research as a student provides an incredible opportunity to enhance your experience while at UC and get valuable hands-on experience.


Research allows you to:

- Research also allows you to collaborate closely with faculty who are distinguished leaders in their fields. 70 UC faculty and staff have been awarded Nobel prizes and are faculty are considered among the world's most influential.
- And finally, students may be awarded a monetary stipend for research participation, or receive class credit to help you progress towards your degree.






A UC degree is worth it. And we can help you pay for it. Our financial aid program is one of the best out there. It supports students in all kinds of ways —with grants, scholarships, low-interest loans, and more. So let's talk about our financial support for students.




Most California students with families earning up to \$100,000 pay no tuition to attend due to the financial aid they receive.

With tuition stability for six academic years upon enrollment, families can plan for estimated education costs.





- Under our Blue and Gold opportunity Plan, most California students from families earning less than\$100,000 a year pay no tuition to attend. We are committed to providing aid for our neediest students and ensuring that cost is not a barrier for their education.
- Our tuition stability policy creates predictability for families. UC Tuition is set at during the first term of enrollment and families can plan for their tuition to remain the same for up to 6 academic years.
- These aid programs are part of the reason why nearly 60% of California undergraduates graduate with no student loan debt!




Let's talk numbers. What does our financial aid look like in action?

OF CALIFORNIA

- Nearly 70% of California undergraduates receive grants and scholarships with an average award of \$20,000. That's money you don't have to pay back.
- More than half of California undergrads pay **no tuition** because of the grants and scholarship aid they receive.

Cost of attendance is UC's average estimate of costs across the system. Actual costs will vary depending on personal expenses and the campus attended. Financial aid is awarded based on total cost of attendance, not only on tuition and fees/ This helps students by raising the limit for how much financial aid could possibly be awarded.

Note:

- The type of room and board students choose will impact the cost (e.g., single rooms cost more than triples).
- If students are covered by family health insurance, these costs will be lower.


*UC Tuition remains flat for up to six years under the Tuition Stability Plan. It includes systemwide tuition (the cost of classes for California resident students), and student services fees for areas such as student government, student public transportation, and building improvements. These fees are set regardless of the method of instruction and will not be refunded in the event instruction occurs remotely for any part of the academic year

- The Associated Students of the University of California (ASUC) one of the only autonomous student organizations in the country. Student leaders are elected to tackle issues that are important to Berkeley students in collaboration with campus administrators. (examples 24 hours study spaces, gender equity, mental health services, etc.)
- Public Service programs available on campus, including Build (where you can mentor youth in reading), Cal in the Capital (where you can intern in Washington DC), or do service learning trips through Alternative Breaks.

- Berkeley's student engagement and activism dates back to the free speech moment from the 1960s, which sparked our students continued challenging of the status quo. Berkeley students are encouraged to take on issues important to them

This past olympic games (Paris 2024) Cal's contingent of 59 Olympians amassed 23 medals while competing in nine different sports. That tied the Cal record for most medals accrued during a single Olympics and was the second-most of any school in the country. If Cal was a country, it would have ranked 12th in the overall medal count. Golden Bears also accounted for almost one-quarter of the 98 total medals accumulated by ACC institutions.

Berkeley Recreation and Wellbeing manages 7 basketball courts, 5 tennis courts, 4 pools, and 3 fitness centers for our student body. We have 8,000 students participate in intramural sports every year.

You can make the most of a wide range of available UC Berkeley Recreation & Wellbeing Fitness and Wellness opportunities to enhance your quality of life and mental health. Get guidance on nutrition and healthy eating. Take a health and safety class, such as CPR. Join in fitness and wellness workshops, instructional, WorkFit, or group exercise sessions. Kick-start or boost your well-being with personal training.



Berkeley supports discovery through...

- The Discovery Initiative creates hands-on, immersive projects that are accessible to all students through the Discovery Hub.
- Several academic pathways offer discovery, community, and mentorship opportunities around academic areas of interest (i.e. <u>L&S Pathways</u>)
- Research Opportunities are available for undergraduates
 - URAP (Undergraduate Research Apprenticeship Program) is a program where students work with faculty/staff mentors, and a great opportunity to learn how to conduct research
 - Haas Scholars is a program that funds capstone experiences (https://research.berkeley.edu/haas-scholars)
 - There are many scholarships and prizes are available to support students engaging in research
 - Examples of the research that students engage in, including those in the humanities and social sciences can be found <u>here</u>
- There are also discovery experiences that are entirely student-led. Undergraduate students can create courses to teach, while others can receive credit for taking those classes while receiving academic credit towards degree.
 - Topics like: The Power of Networking, to Adulting, to Human-Centered Design, to even fun topics like Harry Potter and Intro to Baking.

UC Berkeley

At Berkeley, our 150+ undergraduate programs are divided into seven - six colleges and one school (publications display each major)

- L&S: largest college (around 75% of students) with majors in the arts/humanities, social sciences, physical & biological sciences, and interdisciplinary studies (fancy way of saying you can create your own major) Top English program in the country.
- COC: one of the only colleges in the country specifically dedicated to the area of chemistry, and
 provides the opportunity and means for student to meet major scientific and technological
 challenges, such as addressing climate change, increasing the world's food supply, synthesizing new
 materials, and discovering and delivering important drugs
- COE: one of the top engineering schools in the country that offers a dynamic, interdisciplinary, handson education
- CED: smaller school but great interdisciplinary approach to majors like architecture,, urban design, and sustainable environmental design
- CNR: Rausser College focus on environmental sciences with majors in health and science fields. Strong option for students interested in pre-med because of the heavy health/science focus.
- CDSS: Is Berkeley's newest college where students explore solutions to society's greatest challenges through computing and data science. Majors include: computer science, data science, and statistics.
- Haas: Second oldest business school. One major in business administration but can have a
 concentration in areas such as accounting, marketing, and international business and has several
 special programs, including Global Management; Management, Entrepreneurship and Technology,
 and the new Spieker Undergraduate Business program for first-year applicants.

*Each college, except for L&S, admits students directly to the major selected on the application. Students who have selected an L&S high-demand major as the high-demand major will have a guaranteed space in the major (https://admissions.berkeley.edu/academics/ls-high-demand-policy/)

*There are no undeclared options for transfer students.



 - Transfer housing is available, and more is on the way with Anchor House, a dedicated transfer


residence hall coming soon.

Berkeley was founded with the idea that students will make their voices heard. With a history of **activism**, **leadership** and **discoveries**, Berkeley is in a class of its own.








- Our university offers more than 100 majors, summer programs, undergraduate research and academic support systems. Together, we'll go beyond what's expected.

 alone in that pursuit.







- One of the most popular questions from prospective students is, "Where is Irvine?" Talk about location between LA and San Diego, close to the beach, ideal weather
 - UCI is located in the heart of Orange County, which makes it an ideal location for enjoying the beach, shopping, making connections in a valuable internship and visiting Disneyland!
 - Not only is the weather on campus 75 degrees and sunny most of the year, but for 15 years, Irvine has been ranked by the FBI as one of the safest large cities in the United States (large cities are ones over 100,000 people; Irvine has around 280,000 people).
 - Campus is located about a 10 minute drive from Newport Beach, and many of our student organizations host bonfires or other activities at the beach



- One aspect of UCI that makes it unique in the UC system is the physical layout of campus, in concentric circles. Irvine and UCI were both strategically designed, when we were built 50 years ago, to make it easy to get around campus and also to collaborate between different schools and departments. This is one of the differences that truly makes a difference for our faculty and students you will find many professors on our campus who may specialize in one area but are doing collaborative research or teaching in a different area.
- In the center of campus is Aldrich Park, then moving out to Ring Road, you will find all of your classroom buildings situated around this perfect one-mile circle. Freshman housing at Mesa Court and Middle Earth are also located near the heart of campus.
- While the campus may seem large, it only takes about 10 minutes to walk across the park and about 20 minutes to walk around the circle, and you will find smiling faces as you walk around!

UCSC is a place where you can find community, right where you live and learn. Rather than a traditional university experience, where residential spaces are **separate** from academic spaces at UC Santa Cruz these are **shared** spaces. Residential buildings **sit next to** academic classrooms and academic advisors work within the **10** residential colleges. The best way to learn more about each college is to visit **housing.ucsc.edu** and view videos of the colleges made by current students on our Undergraduate Admissions YouTube channel.

The most important point to know about the colleges is they are not based on major. Whether you are a first year or transfer student, live on-campus or off-campus, you are affiliated with a college.

Let me share an example: College Nine is focused on "international and global perspectives" and open in 2000. It has college nights monthly which focus around exploring international cultures and cultural issues. It is also where the International Living Center is located. Or you may want to look at Stevenson College. Stevenson is focused on 'self and society' and emphasis self-understanding and your role in the larger community. It is unique because it offers a 2 quarter Core Course focused on the themes of 'self and society'. All the residential colleges have a required core course first year students take, and which is

centered on the theme of the college.





If you're interested in applying to UC, it's important to be aware of our minimum admission requirements regardless if you intend to start as a first-year student – meaning you plan to enroll at UC after high school – or as a transfer student – meaning you plan to enroll at UC after taking some college coursework first.

Selection

All campuses receive more applications than they can accept. **Meeting minimum requirements does not guarantee admission!**

UC utilizes a **comprehensive review** process, which means everything in the application is taken into consideration. There is no magic formula for admission.

Context is an important consideration within this review process. What opportunities were available to you, and how did you take advantage of them?





While each campus has different enrollment goals and application numbers, all campuses receive more applications from qualified students than they can admit. Therefore, in the selection process, meeting the minimum requirements alone does not guarantee admission.

UC uses a comprehensive review process, which means we look at everything you've accomplished in the context of the opportunities available to you. This means there is no magic formula for admission or cookie-cutter student we're looking for because that school, family and community context looks different for every student. But it does mean that we're looking beyond your coursework and grades. Comprehensive review includes 13 factors that our faculty have identified and they include both academic and non-academic factors. You can learn more about these factors on our admissions website. No one factor will determine your admission decision.

Tips for high school students

A-G REQUIREMENTS

Aim to exceed the minimum requirements wherever possible.

Electives can highlight academic interests and strengths.

Take advantage of any AP/IB/Honors courses that your school offers. Challenge yourself where possible.

College courses can be a viable option if your AP/IB/Honors options are limited.

GPA

Academic excellence matters. Strong students will have more campus options and it may even mean more scholarship opportunities!

Remember, the UC GPA is calculated using your A-G coursework completed in 10th and 11th grades.

AP, IB, UC-approved honors and college-level courses calculated in the UC GPA receive extra weight.

EXTRACURRICULARS

UC emphasizes quality over quantity.

When reviewing activities and involvements, we look for:

- Commitment over time
- Leadership (skills, not just a title)
- Progression (where applicable)

UC does not value certain activities over others.

Nontraditional activities and commitments are also considered! Context is key.



Tips for transfer students

ACADEMIC PREPARATION

Complete the UC-E and UC-M requirements as soon as possible.

In addition to the minimum requirements, prioritize any required or recommended major preparation.

IGETC is not a requirement for admission. Campuses will look for major preparation before general education.

Explore the Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) program to see if your intended campus and major are available!

PLANNING TOOLS

Create a UC TAP account to keep track of your UC-transferable coursework, GPA and academic progress.

If attending a California community college, use Assist.org to review any major preparation requirements and plan your coursework.

Stay in contact with admission representatives along the way! We are here to help you.

EXTRACURRICULARS

Look for opportunities for engagement outside of the classroom, including:



Applying to UC is a yearlong process.

The UC Application opens August 1 every year, but submission is not available until October 1. It is *not* on a first-come, first-serve basis, so take your time with your UC Application. For fall 2026 applicants only, the filing deadline has been extended until December 1 (typically November 30). All applications must be submitted by midnight on **Monday, December 1.**

Campuses then review every application and release decisions in the spring, with first-year decisions being released primarily in March and transfer decisions released in April.

From there, admitted applicants will need to decide which campus is the right fit for them and submit a Statement of Intent to register by the deadline.

Some campuses may offer Winter/Spring admission, particularly for transfers. The timeline differs, with the Winter application filed in July, admission decisions beginning in September, and the SIR deadline of October 15.

FIND YOUR FIT

Follow the UC campuses on social media.

Attend campus events and programs to better understand which campuses align with your academic, personal and extracurricular interests.

When deciding which campuses are best for you, consider:

- Campus size
- Major choice
- Location/environment



PREPARE

It's never too early to start exploring UC.

Whether you intend to apply as a first-year or transfer applicant, be sure you understand the admission requirements so that you can ensure you will meet them.

Keep track of your accomplishments! The more organized you stay now, the easier the application process will be.



ASK FOR HELP

Connect with admission reps. All of the UC campuses are here to help support you and answer your questions!

Be sure you're checking in with your school counselors regularly. This will help ensure you are staying on track.
